4 Techs Benched In Tilt

Temper flared last night in Arcata, Calif., but the Humboldt State Lumberjacks played it cool, potting 24 points in the last quarter to subdue the Oregon Tech Owls, 72-55, in the first of a two-game series.

The teams meet again tonight.

The Owles held a 31-24 lead at halftime but in the second half lost four regulars as the 'Jacks pulled ahead 48-42 going into the fourth quarter and poured it on in the last frame.

Tom Schubert and Jerry Wyatt, high scorers for the Owls with 14 and 13 points, fouled out, as did Walter Butler, Len Genetich, with four fouls, was ejected in the last quarter, when charged with a deliberate foul.

Joe Myers led Humboldt with 18 points. Forward George Ibarreta and Glen Wallace threw in 14 each.

The Owls were called on 23 fouls, while Humboldt was whistled down just 13 times.

The Owls reserves were no match for Humboldt in the high-scoring last quarter.

Rod Davis, ex-Klamath Union high school athlete, was described as one of "the outstanding players" on the 1952 Army Junior Varsity football squad at the United States Military Academy, West Point, N. Y., in a release from the Public Information office.

Rod (Cadet Reginald R.) son of Mr. and Mrs. R. Q. Davis, 1526 Crescent, is a third classman (sophomore) at West Point. The speedy halfback received his appointment to West Point from ex-Rep. Lowell Stockman, 2nd district of Oregon.

A graduate of KUHS in 1951, he won letters twice in football and baseball and once in basketball. He was chosen all-district halfback in 1950.

Cadet Davis hopes to be commissioned in the Air Force after graduation in 1955.

Rumor Sugar To Quit Ring

NEW YORK (AP) — Sugar Ray Robinson is still the middleweight champion but indications Tuesday were that the converted song and dance man is just a step or two from waiting out of the professional boxing picture.

A close friend and advisor of the 160-pound titleholder said Robinson had prepared his retirement announcement and is ready to submit it to Abe Green, commissioner of the National Boxing Association.

In Paterson, N. J., Green said that he had received no word from Robinson and knew of no impending announcement.

But the 31-year-old kingpin, who returned here Monday from an engagement in a Boston night club, is reported to have told several intimates that he will never fight again but will take to the road with his song-and-dance routines.

'Sudden Death' For Pro Tilt

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Commissioner Bert Bell of the National Football League says there will be no tie score when the Detroit Lions and the Los Angeles Rams meet at Detroit Sunday to play off the deadlock in the loop's National Conference.

Bell said Monday that in the event of a tie score at the end of the regulation game Sunday, the two teams will start a "sudden death" period, with the first team to score gaining the victory.

The winner will meet the Cleveland Browns, champs of the league's American Conference, for the title at Cleveland Dec. 28.

Schroeder Tees Off On Gardner Mulloy

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Ted Schroeder, who is out here this time strictly as a sightseer and newspaper expert on the approaching Davis Cup Matches, has asked and been granted permission to take a long-distance belt at his old club teammate Gardner Mulloy.

Incensed at Mulloy's reported criticism of the makeup of the current American squad, Ted sat down and carefully wrote this out in pencil.

"Gardner might, I think, be thankful to the organization which gave him many an ungraspable opportunity. Failing in this, he might keep his counsel or possibly even show a little sportsmanship by backing his country's team while it is competing abroad."

Having got that down on paper, Schroeder enlarged upon it orally, emphasizing his remarks with gestures.

"What I mean," he said, "is that this guy has had every chance in the world in the biggest events at Wimbledon, Forest Hills and elsewhere and yet never once in his life came through when the chips were down. He's reached the quarter-finals and finals but tell me one big match he ever won. Yet now he has the nerve to criticize players who have gone out and won the big ones."

This is as good a spot as any to recall Mulloy reached the finals of the U. S. Championships at Forest Hills last September, where he lost to Australia's Frank Sedgman. Mulloy has been tentatively ranked No. 1 by the U. S. Lawn Tennis Association's Rating Committee.

It was not reported here that Mulloy made any cracks about Schroeder himself but the West Coast firebrand obviously remembers criticism he took in other years when he was chosen to play for his country and feels like hitting back at somebody.

You will recall there was a ruckus last year when Schroeder was picked over Dick Savitt to play in the Challenge Round against the Australians and before that in 1946 when he ousted Frankie Parker from a single's berth.

Ted has been known to pick up the phone after midnight and argue across country with some tennis writer who had wounded him. He pays for such calls too.

Sedgman Pro Rumors Fly

MELBOURNE, (AP) — Rumors are flying again that Frank Sedgman, the world's top-ranking amateur tennis player, will turn professional after the Davis Cup challenge round ends in Adelaide Dec. 31.

The 26-year-old Aussie flash has applied for a tax clearance to leave Australia Jan. 3 for the United States. Although such a clearance is necessary for every person leaving the country, Sedgman pointed out "it doesn't necessarily mean I am turning pro."

It often has been reported that Sedgman and Ken McGregor, Australia's No. 2 player, would join Jack Kramer and Pancho Segura on a world pro tour. McGregor has refused comment on the matter.

Sedgman said he wouldn't make any decision until after the Davis Cup.

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Heinrich To Throw For West

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Arm will be pitching passes for the West in the annual Shrine East-West football game here Dec. 27.

Army officials disclosed Monday they have deferred Pvt. Don (The Arm) Heinrich's basic training to permit the University of Washington's two-time All-America quarterback to play for the West in the charity game.

Heinrich, the nation's leading collegiate passer, was drafted shortly before the Washington-Washington State game in November. He was given a pass, however, to play in the game. Later he was shipped to The Presidio here.

Army officials said Heinrich will begin his basic training Jan. 1, at Camp Roberts, near San Luis Obispo, Calif., or Fort Ord, near Monterey.

Whitman Whips Eastern Oregon

WALLA WALLA (AP) — The Whitman College Missionaries, back on their own court after a disastrous road trip, opened their home basketball season Monday night with a 69-56 win over Eastern Oregon College of Education.

The Missionaries, who dropped five straight on the road including one to EOCe, took the lead early in the second quarter and were never threatened. They led 36-29 at the half.
