Navy Rocket Equals Record

WASHINGTON (U) — The Navy's Viking 9 has soared 135 miles straight up to equal the altitude record for single-stage rockets set more than a year ago by its Viking 7.

The Defense Department said the second record left, equaling the height reached Aug. 7, 1951, was made yesterday at the same place — the Army White Sands Proving Grounds, Los Cruces, N. M.

The Army's WAC Corporal has gone 250 miles up but not in one stage. It took off from an already airborne German V-2. The Viking 9, which weighs 7½ tons and is 42 feet long, carried instruments for measuring upper-air sunlight. The Defense Department said it was traveling 3,900 miles an hour when its fuel ran out.

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Stock Theft Case Faulty

An indictment charging Albert George Tice, 43-year-old Stonyford, Calif., rancher, with larceny of livestock was dismissed this morning in Circuit Court.

The indictment was faulty, and Tice's case probably will be resubmitted to the grand jury.

In drawing up the indictment, the district attorney's office set the date of the alleged crime at October 20, 1952, but the indictment was returned by the grand jury a week before that date, on Oct. 13, 1952.

The date in the indictment should have been 1951.

Tice, who is free on \$5,000 bond, appeared in court this morning to enter a plea to the charge, and his attorney, E. E. Driscoll, pointed out the erroneous date in the indictment and asked Judge David R. Vandenberg to dismiss it. The judge did.

Tice's bond was continued until the case is put before the grand jury again.

The rancher is accused of stealing a cow, belonging to the Earl Kerns ranch at Fort Klamath, and some of his own cattle. He reportedly claims it was a branding mistake.

general repeatedly has refused to be drawn into a discussion of the matter.

Sens. Carlson and Smith said they had avoided bringing up the subject at their separate conferences with Eisenhower. But Smith said he had discussed it later with Carlson. Smith said he also had talked it over with Taft, and with Bridges too.

"There isn't going to be any contest for leadership of the Senate," Carlson declared. "We are going to sit around a table and work it out."

Smith said Taft told him he was wondering whether he ought to pass up chairmanship of the Senate Labor Committee if he were named majority leader.

Smith added that he urged Taft to handle both jobs. The Ohioan, Smith said, is brilliant and has no superior in the Senate from the standpoint of ability.

Smith talked to Gov. Sherman Adams of New Hampshire, who will be assistant to the new President, about the complaints of some GOP senators that Eisenhower appointments are not being sent through customary senatorial channels.

The senator indicated he had received assurance they will be in the future.

"There may have been some shippo," said Smith, "but there has been nothing flagrant."

Other Eisenhower callers yesterday included Prime Minister Sidney Holland of New Zealand, and that country's ambassador to the United States, Leslie K. Monro.

SEOUL (U) — Allied Sabre jet pilots shot down one Communist MIG jet and damaged four in four dogfights over North Korea today, the Fifth Air Force said.

The destroyed MIG went down in flames. Pilots said it crashed just north of the Yalu River, the Korean-Manchurian boundary.

Col. James K. Johnson of Phoenix, Ariz., was credited with the MIG kill. He is commander of the 4th Fighter-Interceptor Wing.

Credited with damaging MIGs were 2nd Lt. Paul J. Jacobsen, Elmore, Minn.; Capt. Vincent E. Stacy, Crystal Falls, Mich.; Maj. Vermont Garrison, Mt. Victory, Ky., and Marine Maj. Edwin H. Finlayson, Monticello, Fla.

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12th Red Bluff Bull Sale Due

The Twelfth Annual Range Bull Sale, sponsored by the Tehama County Cattlemen's Assoc., has been scheduled for Feb. 5, 6 and 7 at Red Bluff, according to C. F. Stover, Sale Committee chairman.

Stover said that a total of 300 Herefords, 70 Shorthorns and 30 Angus breeding age bulls had been consigned to the event by 118 of the west's outstanding breeders operating in California, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, Utah, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.

He added that at the 1952 event held last February, \$335,000 dollars worth of graded and inspected range bulls were purchased by commercial cattlemen living in 37 California Counties, Oregon, Washington and Nevada.

The Red Bluff Range Bull Sale, initiated in 1942 as a means of improving Tehama County beef cattle through the importation of quality range sires, is now known as America's largest sale of high quality animals. Approximately 3,500 cattlemen living in every western state attended the 1952 event, he said.

The sale features the University of California Record-of-Performance grading program, under which each individual bull is given a rating on the basis of conformation. It also emphasizes sound-
