Pete Still 'Has It', Batters Tor Yamato

Pete Belcastro still carries the dynamite that made the Weed Assassin Klamath Falls' top drawing card for several years here. The Mauling Milkman has left none of his two-fisted power on his Weed dairy ranch. He trotted it out for a large crowd of fans last night at the Armory to batter Tor Yamato into submission, although Belcastro actually won the fight when Yamato was thumped out by Referee Black Davidson in the second go-round. It was a typical scene with Pete's face covered with blood as he pounded the Jap from ringpost to ringpost with his savage whirlwind attack to capture the first fall in 15 minutes.

WRONG FOOT

Yamato got off on his wrong bare foot right off the bat when he back-handed Belcastro during instructions in the center of the ring. The Nip had the best of it for awhile. But Belcastro started throwing punches when it looked

like he was set up for Yamato's sleeper hold to temporarily turn the tide of battle. Yamato dumped Belcastro out of the ring after digging his bare toes into the Assassin's Adam's Apple. Belcastro got back into playing territory with a shoulder butt through the ropes.

That's when the fun started and the fans saw the Belcastro of old. Yamato started Pete's nose bleeding when he led the Weed wrestler around the ring with a headlock and gouged him with his right hand.

THAT'S ALL. That was all for Yamato. Belcastro broke loose, battered the Jap with an overhand right, rattled him with another of the same, and followed with his famous up-purcut that carried all of his 195 pounds behind it.

It was no chore then for Belcastro to pin the Jap.

Yamato was handing Belcastro eyes full of rope in the second go-round and repeatedly ignored Davidson's orders to break it up. After the fourth warning, Davidson shoved Yamato aside and lifted Belcastro's big right arm in victory.

That touched off a fight between Yamato and Davidson that was almost as good as the main event. Police had to escort the Jap to the dressing-room as irate fans pressed around Yamato after the bout.

Jack Terry won the first fall from Georges Dusette in the semi-windup but the French-Canadian's powerful full nelson paid off before the bout was over.

Terry won the first fall with the sleeper hold after setting Dusette up with hatchet blows.

VICTORY. That took Terry 12 and a half minutes but in just 25 seconds longer than that Dusette had two falls and the victory.

The first came in 4 and a half minutes with the full nelson after returning Terry's kidney-blow attack.

Terry escaped the full nelson twice in the third heat, but the third time Dusette lifted him back into the center of the ring for the pay-off nelson.

A newcomer here, Bronco Lulich of Pittsburgh, and Tony Ross, the Salem Slaughterer, drew in the 30-minute opener.

Last night's card closed down wrestling until early January.

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Soviets, Germans Make Up

FRANKFURT, Germany, (AP) — German sportsmen have tipped a hole in the Iron Curtain and agreed to resume competition between the Soviet Zone and West Germany. Relations were broken off last September because Eastern authorities refused to guarantee sports contests with West Germans would not be used for political purposes. Although both West and East Germany have held their own championships since 1949, athletes from both parts of the country used to meet in friendly rivalry until this year.

But when the West German track or soccer team went to the Eastern sector the stadiums were decorated with Red flags, huge Stalin pictures and banners called for friendship with Soviet Russia as "the only peace loving power in the world."

Last week end sports officials from both sections met in a west Berlin hotel and after hours of negotiating issued this statement: "Sports relations will be resumed. All international sports meets will be held in true Olympic spirit. There will be no political speeches at the contests. No political banners or slogans will be displayed. The only flag raised will be the black, red and gold, which is the national flag of both the East and West German republics."

Bobo Olson Fight Pick

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Fans may well be watching the next middleweight champion of the world when Carl (Bobo) Olson of Boston in a 10 rounder here Thursday night.

Olson strengthened his position as No. 1 challenger by flattening highly rated Lee Sain of Pittsburgh in two rounds here a month ago. Last year, he lost a close 15 round decision to champion Sugar Ray Robinson.

Bobo is expected to figure strongly in the title picture if Sugar Ray retires, as reported.

Olson, 24, has been installed a 7 to 10 favorite.

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Women Shoot For \$24,500

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Professional women golfers will shoot for \$24,500 in a seven-tournament schedule next spring.

The competition was announced Thursday by Mrs. Louis Lengfeld of San Francisco, director of the California women's golf circuit. It will be known as the "Ladies PGA Gold Coast Tour", and is the richest yet arranged.

The tour will include two stages of the four-leg annual cross country Weatherhaven Derby, April 11-12 at Phoenix, Ariz., and May 2-3 at San Francisco. Both are \$3,000 events.

Starting at Phoenix, the women pros will swing to Palm Springs, Calif., April 15-16 for the \$3,000 Palm Springs women's open; April 18-19 at Long Beach or in the Los Angeles area, \$3,500; April 25-26 at Bakersfield, ladies PGA exhibition, \$3,500; May 2-3, San Francisco, Weatherhaven competition; May 9-10, at Sacramento, the Barbara Romack tournament, \$3,500 and May 15-16 at Reno, \$5,000 Nevada State women's open championship.

Caterpillars Beat Vandals

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — The Idaho Vandals dropped a 61-52 basketball decision to the touring Peoria Caterpillars Wednesday night but gave the National AAU champions a rough time from the opening tipoff.

Idaho, ahead 13-11 at the end of the first quarter, trailed 28-25 at the half, but tied the game three times in the third period. The Cats didn't ice the game until after the three-minute rule went into effect. Leading 52-48 at the time, the Cats connected on nine free throws as Idaho piled up fouls in the closing minutes. Idaho's Tommy Flynn and the Cats' Dan Tippen shared scoring honors with 15 points apiece. Eleven of Tippen's points were on free throws, including eight of the nine in the last three minutes.

Sullivan Quits Braves

BOSTON (AP) — William H. Sullivan Jr. Thursday announced his resignation as publicity director of the Boston Braves to join Frank Leahy, Notre Dame football coach, in the recently incorporated All-Star Sports Associates. Sullivan will be succeeded as tribal tub-thumper by Charles W. Sands, effective Jan. 1.

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
