

Reorganization Powers May Be Made Permanent

WASHINGTON (AP)—A White House advisory group recommended today that Congress make permanent the President's power to reorganize the executive branch of the government.

The President now has authority, which expires March 31, to put into effect specific reorganization plans unless they are vetoed by either branch of Congress with a definite time limit.

The President's Advisory Committee on Management, in a report to Truman, termed this arrangement "the greatest single enabling step toward management improvement in the federal government in this generation."

The 13-member advisory group, set up three years ago, is headed by Thomas A. Morgan, board chairman of the Sperry Gyroscope Company. In its final report to the President, the committee said that during the last fiscal year the gov-

ernment realized savings of some \$6 million dollars as a result of suggestions from employees.

The committee said it believed that the government, with some 2,600,000 civilian employees and another 3,500,000 men and women in uniform, cannot be run like private business.

The committee said that "no business organization has its governing authority so divided and diffused and, consequently, its policy and program objectives so difficult of interpretation by its managerial officials."

"The Congress legislates copiously on a myriad of procedural and organizational details, in contrast to the usual practice of boards of directors of private corporations. Independent commissions go their autonomous ways. Congressional committees and private interest groups are accustomed to deal directly with fragmented units of the administration. No single central authority can impose its will on this mosaic."

Marines Give Playground

The residents of Lindley Heights are being given two acres of ground, designated for a park and playground area.

The gift is to be made Friday by the Grater Lake Detachment of the Marine Corps League, which in years past had acquired the vacant property with a view to establishing some sort of memorial to the Marines from Klamath Falls and Klamath County who have died in action.

Clement Lesueur, commandant of the Marine Corps League detachment, is to present the deed to the property to County Judge U. E. Reeder, and Judge Reeder has agreed to appoint Ted Bingham, a resident of the area, as caretaker of the property.

There are no strings attached to the deed to the property, so that the county can make whatever disposition it wishes, but the Marine Corps League is making a recommendation that the two acres be used for a playground.

At present there is a designated playground for children of the Lindley Heights area.

The Marine Corps League also wants the county to erect a marker reading:

"This park area has been given in memory of the gallant U.S. Marines who gave their lives that we might live."

There also is an understanding that a portion of the property may be sold to obtain funds to equip the park.

A possibility is that the people of the Lindley Heights area may choose to form a park district, similar to the Ward Park District, to equip and operate a public playground, using the donated property as a starting point.

Beck Misses Honor Dinner

SEATTLE (AP)—The men who came to dinner Wednesday night stayed to honor the man who couldn't make it.

He was Dave Beck, recently elected president of the AFL Teamsters' International Union.

Some 450 businessmen, civic and union leaders were invited to the testimonial dinner honoring Beck. Most of them showed up on schedule, but the guest of honor — on doctor's orders — was home in bed.

Earlier in the day Beck suffered an attack of kidney stones and when he failed to respond properly to treatment, doctors ordered him to pass up the banquet.

The guests stayed on for the food and the speeches, though. The latter were changed to meet the emergency.

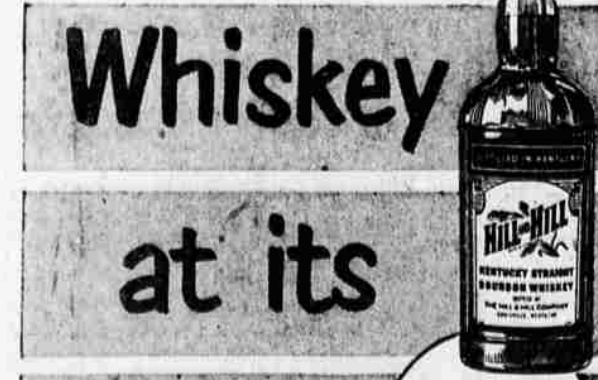
The doctors said Beck's condition was not believed serious.
