Oregon Tech makes its third home stand of the season tonight against the Pacific University Badgers and the Owls hope to find the recipe for victory before a part of the trip to the mile-high court. Coach Art Kirkland's Owls have just completed a road tour—where losing is easy but victory comes the hard way. The Owls managed one triumph in four starts in doubleheaders against Southern Oregon and Humboldt State.

Leading at halftime in their double setback to the HEC Lumberjacks and their one loss to the SOG Raiders, the Owls feel better after intermission time, dropping all three decisions via the free throw route.

2-6 RECORD
The one-of-four traveling stint plus an opening home split with Weber College sends the Owls against Pacific tonight with a 2-6 record.

Pacific has had its troubles on the road, too. Its losses included defeats by Southern Oregon twice, Portland State and Oregon College.

Kirkland starts tonight with forward Jerry Wyatt, center Tom Schubert, guards Len Gettlin and Walter Butler, with either Tom Humphrey or John Henkle at the other forward position.

LAST CHANCE
Tonight will be the last chance for OTT fans to watch the Owls at home until Jan. 3 when they host Southern Oregon.

The Owls have a nine-day rest from cage wars. They go north for games with Olympic Junior College and Skagit Valley JC Dec. 20 and 21.

Tip-off time tonight is 8 o'clock.

Trabert Hot In Win Over Italian Lad

SYDNEY, Australia (AP)—The Australians became fully aware today that in Tony Trabert the Americans have an extremely capable second singles player for tennis to face in the coming Davis Cup challenge round.

Trabert, from Cincinnati, O., pulled out all the stops today in trouncing Italy's crack youngster, Franco Gardini, 6-3, 7-5, and 6-2.

Australian experts unanimously agreed that Tony is more dangerous right now than he was a year ago, and the fact that he had spent time in the Navy.

CONVINCING
Trabert trimmed Gardini in far more convincing fashion than Vic Seixas, the American captain, who was carried to five sets in whipping the latter Gardini Thursday.

Off today's game Tony has been made the favorite over the Australian number two Davis Cup singles player, Gardini's Ken Rose.

McGregor or Mervyn Rose, Gardini was a very sound player but he was almost completely helpless when Trabert was getting his first service in. In all Trabert reeked 13 clean aces past Gardini.

Despite the loss to a superior player, the Italian put up such a courageous battle and joined Trabert in so many spectacular rallies that Australians are almost certain to bring him back for the Melbourne Championships, which follows the Davis Cup challenge round.

NO TROUBLE
In the opening match of the final day's program which saw the American team sweep the Italians into a 3-0 defeat, Gardini's Richardson had no difficulty in defeating Rolando del Bello 7-5, 6-3, 5-7 and 6-2.

Richardson was forced to double fault four straight times in the next to last game of the third set.

Seixas and Trabert were scheduled to hold a workout tomorrow on the Adelaide grass courts, scene of the Davis Cup matches. Seixas expressed confidence that the American team would bring the cup back home.

Top Weight For Calumet Nags

Panthers Trounce Pelicans

The Chico Panthers won handily over the Klamath Pelicans last night, 67-46, in the first of a two-game road stand for the Klamath five.

The two teams play again tonight.

Except for a brief lead in the early moments of the game and a third-quarter rally that brought the Pelicans within seven points of Chico, the Klamath five never seriously threatened.

The Pelicans captured an early 3-0 lead but trailed 9-20 at the end of the first frame, and 29-32 at the half.

The Klamath team closed the gap to 30-37 late in the third chapter, but a bucket by Bob Fidler and two hook shots by Jerry Behlander gave the Panthers a 43-31 lead going into the final quarter.

Behlander finished with 19, Fidler with 18, Ken Young was high for the Pelas with 9 points.

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Billy Graham Whips Giardello In Weird Switch of Scorecard

NEW YORK (AP)—Chairman Bob Christenberry of the New York State Athletic Commission is in the middle of an old-fashioned ruckus because he reversed an official's score card to give Billy Graham a split decision win over Joe Giardello in the usual Friday night confusion at Madison Square Garden.

The television customers must be shocked. They heard Giardello proclaimed the winner. Then a few minutes later ring announcer Johnny Addie made Joe an unofficial winner, subject to a review of the cards.

DISGRUNTLED
Long after the disgruntled crowd of 3,228 paying \$3,864 and left the darkened Garden, Christenberry made Graham the winner.

Graham, a New Yorker, incidentally weighed 148 to 151 for the Philadelphia counter puncher.

Judge Joe Agnello's card, originally scored for Giardello 6-4 in rounds, was the one that upset Christenberry. Agnello had scored the 10th round for Giardello while both the other officials gave it to Graham.

UNPRECEDENTED
Christenberry, in a move believed to be unprecedented, changed the 10th round, instead of a one point round for Giardello, he made it a two point round for Graham on the Agnello card. He also changed the fourth round from one-point for Graham to a two-point for Graham.

As a result Agnello's final and "official" card came out even 5-5 in rounds with Graham the winner on points 7-6. That was the decision handed out by the officials.

Judge Charley Shorell found for Graham 7-3 and Referee Ray

showed six for Graham, one for Giardello and two voting a draw. The switch brought wild confusion in the official's dressing room. "I'd quit rather than condone anything else."

The small crowd made as much noise as a full house in venting its disapproval of the official's verdict while a heartbroken Graham stood with head down in his corner. The fans crowded around ringside, hurling insults at the official.

Graham, loser of a disputed split decision to Kid Gavilan in an Aug. 29, 1951, title bout, was called the "unwounded champ" for over a year until he was soundly beaten by Gavilan in Havana last October.

He made loud protests about a split decision loss to Giardello last Aug. 4 at Brooklyn's Eastern Parkway. This final bout seemed too much.

"What do I have to do to win in my home town?" he moaned. Christenberry's later visit with the good news brought a grin to his face.

EXPECTED
As might be expected there was a violent reaction in the camp of Giardello. Tony Ferrante, Giardello's manager, said he would take the case to his lawyer to test the legality of the commission's action.

In the meantime, the International Boxing Club announced a Jan. 9 Garden bout between Giardello and Rocky Castellani.

Christenberry said his action meant "no reflection on the honesty and integrity of Mr. Agnello."

He said he understood former Commissioner Jim Farley and John J. Phelan had reversed decisions.

California's Bears, stung by their first defeat of the basketball season at the hands of the high-rated Washington Huskies, have a chance Saturday night to avenge their loss.

The Bears, ranked No. 18 this week in the first Associated Press poll of the young campaign, battled the ninth-place Huskies on even terms into the third quarter Friday night before bowing, 60-50.

Both California and Washington now have 4-1 records for the season.

SEVEN STRAIGHT
In other Friday night games in the Pacific Northwest Division Pacific Coast Conference teams, the unbeaten Brigham Young Cougars racked up their seventh straight by routing Oregon State 69-66, at Corvallis, Ore., and road-weary Washington State dropped another decision in Utah to the University of Utah, 72-57.

All five Northern Division clubs see action Saturday night.

Friday night's threesomes repeat on the same floors. In addition Oregon plays host to dangerous Seattle University at Eugene and Idaho meets one of the strong small school outfits, Eastern Washington College.

Big Bob Houbregs found the range with his consistent hook shot to lead Washington to its win over California. His 20 points were high for the game, but his standout performance was just about matched by the Bears' sophomore ace Bob McKeen, who dunked 17 and did a great defensive job guarding Houbregs.

TO RETIRE
California's veteran coach, Nabe Price, announced before the game he planned to retire after next season, his 30th at the Bears' helm. He will have reached retirement age of 65 before the 1953-54 season ends.

Brigham Young had to beat back a strong OSC fourth quarter surge to win the game, 69-66.

After leading by 18 points at 55-37, BYU saw the Beavers close the gap to 66-66 with a minute to go. Nick Mateljan of BYU took scoring honors with 22 points. Bob Edwards led OSC with 15.

Washington State neared the end of a disastrous road trip as it dropped its third game in Utah at Salt Lake City. Earlier in the week the WSC Cougars lost to Brigham Young and Utah State.

NO DOUBT
Utah never left the issue in doubt after the first few minutes. Pete Mullins of WSC and Bruce Goodrich of Utah were high men with 18 apiece. Utah led at the half, 42-29.

Seattle U's game against the strong Oregon Ducks at Eugene Saturday night opens a road jaunt for the Chieftains that will carry them to Madison Square Garden in New York City. They have lost only one game this season, a 78-73 setback at the hands of last year's National AAU champs, the Peoria Caterpillars.

Hubbell Turns To Flickers
