That cozy twosome, Janet Leigh and Tony Curtis, drew the bouquets as the most co-operative players. The Hollywood Women's Press Club rapped Rita Hayworth and Marjorie Lane as the most unco-operative.

These annual selections are sometimes confusing to outsiders. The poll does not represent the entire press of Hollywood. Males are excluded from voting. The press club is composed of many women who have little or no contact with the stars. Many of the members are press agents, who could have an axe to grind.

A good section of the club consists of fan magazine writers. Thus, stars who won't submit to the scrutinizing fan mag routine are often chosen for the most unco-operative tag.

Let's look at the "unco-op" winners of the past:

Female — Ginger Rogers, Jean Arthur, Joan Fontaine, Sonja Henie, Greer Garson, Ingrid Berg-

## Fremont Log Cut Reported

Approximately \$3 million board feet of lumber, mostly pine, was logged off the Fremont National Forest during this past cutting season, according to the year-end report of the Fremont administration.

The Fremont Sawmill Company of Lakeview had the largest cut on the forest, over 20 million board feet. Weyerhaeuser Timber Company of Klamath Falls and the American Forest Products Corporation of Lakeview each logged about 15 million feet.

The White Pine Lumber Company of Lakeview cut about 13 million board feet in the Dog Lake vicinity, and the Spangler Lumber Company of Bly cut approximately nine million board feet in the Denting Creek and Swede Cabin areas.

Other outfits logging on the Fremont included the Adams Lumber Company of Paisley and the Silver Lake Lumber Company.

During the early part of the summer nearly 600,000 trees were planted on 1,159 acres, mostly in burn areas. Aerial seeding to pine tried early in the season was reported as unsuccessful, because when the snow left last spring birds congregated and picked up much of the seed.

A total of 12,386 head of cattle and 40,214 sheep were allowed to graze on the Fremont by permit this summer, and the year was considered an excellent one by rangers for forage growth.

During the summer there were 134 fires reported on the national forest, only 12 of them man-caused, and the total burn was just 36 acres.

## Top Engineer Dies at 61

DAYTON, O. (AP)—Harvey D. Geyer, retired chief engineer of the Inland Manufacturing Division of General Motors Corp. and who was responsible for improvements in several World War II weapons, died in a hospital here last night.

The 61-year-old Geyer, who held more than 250 patents, was recognized as one of the world's leading authorities in the field of rubber-metal applications.

While serving as a lieutenant colonel at Maryland's Edgewood Arsenal during World War II, Geyer developed a flame thrower with 10 times the effective distance of models then in use. He also was credited with improving phosphorus bombs, grenades and smoke generators.
