

### George (Foghorn) Winslow New Experience for Thomas

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Long ago I made a rule to avoid interviewing child actors if at all possible.

It's not that I'm anti-children; heaven forbid. It's just that my early bouts with child stars were unrewarding experiences, to say the least.

However, I broke the rule to have lunch with George (Foghorn) Winslow. George is 6. He has a voice that resembles Tallulah Bankhead's, with a cold. He also has a sharp, inquisitive face and a knack for saying amazing things.

This knock was discovered a year or so ago by Art Linkletter on one of his kid interviews on the air. This appearance led to a big role in "Room for More" and a contract at 20th Century-Fox. He has since appeared in "Monkey Business," "My Pal Gus" and currently, "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes."

It was lunch hour at the studio. George was finishing his school work for the day. So I waited outside the schoolhouse with his father, Karl Wentzloff, who runs an engineering and designing firm.

"I'm subbing for my wife today," he explained. "She usually stays with George at the studio. But she has to have a day off now and then or she can't take it. Watching after George can be pretty strenuous, you know."

I asked how he kept George's fame from going to his head.

"By reasoning with him," he replied. "We tell him that certain people possess certain talents, but that doesn't make them any better than other people. So far we have succeeded. One day a playmate asked him how much money he was making at the studio. George replied that he didn't want to know, because it might make me conceited."

School was out and George emerged from the classroom with a molded piece of clay. "What is it?" I inquired.

"A flying eggbeater," he replied scornfully, as though I should have known. Then he took off, as if propelled by the gadget. He ran all the way to the commissary. Ah, youth!

At the table, George was less interested in the questions that were asked him than in his eggbeater and a submarine he was modeling.

"What do you want for Christmas?"

"Jane Russell."

"Do you like to work at the studio?"

"No."

"What would you rather be doing?"

"Playing."

"Do you like school?"

"Not particularly."

"What do you like to study best?"

"Recess."

Because George wasn't paying much attention to his cheeseburger, his father took the clay models away from him. A few minutes later, George remarked to his father: "Now I don't want to appear to be commanding you, but I'd like to make a bargain with you. Can I have the submarine or the eggbeater?"

### Committee Raps Military Plushness

WASHINGTON (AP)—House investigators, saying many military installations are too plush, suggest the armed forces are capitalizing on the Korean War to wheedle money from Congress for construction that isn't really needed.

A House expenditures subcommittee, after an investigation of 15 major U. S. bases, said a report released yesterday that it had found evidence of waste, extravagance, "plushness," unnecessary "frills" and improper planning.

The report specifically mentioned "over-elaborate construction" it said the watchdog group found at Limestone Air Force Base in Maine, McClellan AFB, Calif.; and Kelly AFB Tex.

The subcommittee, headed by Rep. Hardy (D-Va.), said in some cases the services have shown "haste and anxiety" to replace usable temporary structures with new buildings, and that interservice rivalry for new buildings has "overhauled the desire to get the most defense for the least cost."

"This situation raises the question as to whether the present emergency is being used to obtain additional plant facilities which are nice but not really urgent," the report said.

The subcommittee also suggested that Congress had voted appropriations on the basis of misleading information. Military men, it said, have been describing their needs in "inadequate, inaccurate or misleading" terms.

"There have been notable achievements in the expansion of military facilities," the report concluded. "Unfortunately, the directives requiring that the planning and design of construction proceed on the most austere basis which is compatible with the really essential military requirements, have too often received only secondary attention."

### Ike Lauded For Appointment

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Welker (R-Idaho), said Sunday night he regards President-elect Eisenhower's selection of Martin P. Durkin to be secretary of labor as "the smartest political move the Republican party has made in 20 years."

Durkin is a veteran labor union official who supported the Democratic presidential ticket.

"I think the appointment will convince the man that carries the dinner pail and the pick that the Republican party really does consider the man who works," Welker said during an NBC television interview.

He added that he does not think Sen. Taft (R-Ohio), who termed the Durkin appointment "incredible" when it was made, would "even suggest" that the Senate refuse to confirm the appointment.

Welker also said he is in favor of turning the billion-dollar Tennessee Valley Authority over to private interests.

"Private enterprise can do anything that government does and do it better," he said.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Fire Chief M. F. Schulte of suburban Carnegie credited the 45-year-old projectionist of a theater with averting a disaster during a quick-spreading fire which destroyed a three-story building, occupied by the Louisa Theater.

More than 200 patrons, mostly children, were attending a matinee yesterday when John Stanton saw smoke curling from the ceiling. He stopped his projection machine, turned on the lights and told the audience.

"There is no reason to be alarmed—just walk out quickly—don't run—and stay out until we're sure everything is all right."

The fire, which caused damage estimated by Schulte at more than \$150,000, gutted the building. The top floors were occupied by bowling alleys.

One of Stanton's four children, Robert, 8, was among the theater patrons. His father's first act, after clearing the theater, was to call home for assurance of his son's safety.
