State Wage Rate High

SALEM (AP)—The average earnings of Oregon's production workers reached a new high in November of \$2.12 an hour and \$2.16 a week, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission said Tuesday.

The new hourly record is four cents above the former top recorded in September. The commission said the new record probably will be first or second in the nation.

Guilty Plea In Check Case

Freightways Offers Awards

Local high school seniors are eligible to compete for one of a number of \$500 scholarships offered again this year by Consolidated Freightways, Inc., Meriton Lang, manager of the firm's local freight terminal announced today. Details of the scholarships are in the hands of school officials.

The motor freight company will award scholarships on a state basis one to each state in which it operates. Additional scholarships may be awarded on an at-large basis, Lang said.

Winners may attend any accredited college or university in the United States. Consolidated Freightways will provide \$250 cash grant-in-aid to any of the institutions selected which are not tax-supported.

An Imperial Scholarship Board composed of leaders of business, industry and education will select the winners. Selection is based on scholastic ability and achievement, activity record, and character.

Consolidated launched the scholarship program as a "continuing expression of our appreciation, both to our customers and to the general public of the areas we serve," according to the official announcement signed by Leland James, president of the company.
