

Plans Made to Fire U.N. Subversives

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wiley (R-Wis.) said today a new move "is in the works to fire subversives from the staff at United Nations."

Wiley, a delegate to the U. N. General Assembly, made the disclosure after a telephone talk with Chairman Robert Ramspeck of the Civil Service Commission, who he said, will have a big part in touching off the house cleaning.

Ramspeck could not immediately be reached for comment.

Eighteen U. S. citizens have been dismissed from U. N. jobs on the ground they were security risks, following a report by a federal grand jury in New York alleging widespread U. S. Communist infiltration of the U. N. staff, Wiley contends others are still on the payrolls of the U. N. Secretariat and of some of the organization's subordinate groups.

Wiley's talk with Ramspeck fol-

lowed a news conference at which the senator had urged a swifter cleanup and questioned whether the Truman administration planned to "sit on its dignity" and leave the problem for the Eisenhower administration to solve.

Today, however, Wiley said that "after my talk with Mr. Ramspeck I am encouraged to believe that President Truman meant business when he ordered the State and Justice Departments and civil service to jointly tackle the problem."

The senator said he now expects the three agencies, with Ramspeck as co-ordinator, will file with U. N. Secretary General Trygve Lie "detailed statements giving the background of employees of questionable loyalty to this country," a step they have not taken until now.

Wiley said Lie has been handicapped because the U. S. government insisted on giving "only a one-point summary such as 'ad-

verse" in asking Lie to fire someone as a security risk.

That, he said, left the secretary general unable to defend a dismissal in any case where the employee appealed. It is partly responsible for protests from other nations against the firings, Wiley added.

"Not one other nation has supported our view," Wiley said, but he added that he expects the detailed statements "can avert a very bad fight over the issue in the General Assembly" and permit this country to demonstrate that it is willing to stand "in insistence on the weeding out of persons of questionable loyalty."

Most foreign nations, he said, have been unable to understand why the U. S. insisted on the dismissal of American Communists, since many other countries even allow Communists some voice in their coalition governments.
