Pope Names Cardinal

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican announced Monday that Archbishop Valeriano Gracias of Bombay is being named to the college of cardinals of the Roman Catholic church.

He takes the place vacated Sunday by the death of Carlo Agostini, patriarch of Venice.

He will be India's first cardinal and the surprise announcement of his appointment, emphasized Pope Pius' determination to bring the college to its full strength of 70 members at the consistory here next month. The college has not had full membership in two centuries.

Archbishop Gracias was born in Karachi, then in India, now the capital of Muslim Pakistan, on Oct. 23, 1900.

He is one of a group of seven cardinal-designates whose average age is only 50—one of the largest groups of comparatively young cardinals ever named to the college.

Agostini died in Venice after having been ill for some time with leukemia.

He was to have received the traditional red hat of a prince of the Roman Catholic church at a secret consistory Jan. 13 along with 23 other designated cardinals.

Deer Hunter Kills Father

CROSS CITY, Fla. (AP) — A 23-year-old hunter sighted a deer's antlers through the brush Sunday, fired and killed his father, W. H. Rosier, 51, Gainesville, Fla.

Rosier had just shot the animal himself and was bending over to cut its throat.

Sheriff L. E. Hatcher termed the tragedy an accident. Trammell G. Day, also of Gainesville, was a witness, he said.

Hatcher identified the son as Bob Rosier, 23, who returned two months ago from duty with the Army in Korea.

Stalin Meet Said Unlikely

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Fulbright (D-Ark.) says he doubts anything useful would come of a Churchill-Stalin-Eisenhower meeting right now because Russia's aim is to bleed and divide the West.

But we "must not take the attitude that there is no hope and refuse to meet with them," Fulbright said. The possibility of a personal conference between the Russian Premier and the U. S. President-elect was raised in a Stalin communication to the New York Times Christmas Eve.

Fulbright, a high-ranking Democrat on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, recently returned from a tour in Europe. He also told television interviewers yesterday:

1. Voice of America broadcasts should be kept going to the Iron Curtain countries because that is the only means of directly reaching Communist peoples, but U. S. propaganda efforts elsewhere should be cut back or changed.
2. Differences between Northern and Southern Democrats are not as serious as many people believe and can be ironed out in the near future.

House Seeks U.N. Testimony

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House committee called today for public testimony on reports that justice officials tried to interfere with a grand jury inquiry into subversives in the United Nations.

The federal grand jury, ending work in New York early this month, recommended that a new grand jury continue an investigation of U. S. citizens with Communist associations who are on the U. N. staff.

The judiciary subcommittee that has been investigating the Justice Department has been chomping into reports that an attempt was made to get the jury to delay or tone down its recommendation on the subject.

After closed-door testimony was taken 10 days ago, Rep. Chelt (D-Ky.) and Rep. Keating (R-NY) told newsmen what they had heard; made their blood boil.

Schools Lack Needed Cash

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation needs 325,000 new public school classrooms but can raise money enough in the usual ways for little more than half of what they will cost, says the U. S. Office of Education.

The cost of such facilities, needed by Sept. 1 to relieve overcrowding and replace the obsolete, was estimated at \$10,700,000,000.

The office said that night states and local districts could produce only \$5,800,000,000 through normal revenue channels by then.

A grand total of 600,000 new classrooms, at a cost of 18 billion dollars, will be needed by 1960, the office said.

Bazooka Shell Seen in Street

BALTIMORE (AP) — Sgt. Joseph W. Koerber was driving along in the stream of Sunday traffic when his sharp eye spied an object in the street.

He jammed on the brakes, skidded for 25 feet and managed to miss a bazooka shell by a hair.

Koerber, who is in the 110th Field Artillery of the Maryland National Guard, called police.

A policeman gingerly carried the shell, the kind used in tank warfare, to a grass plot beside the road. It was three hours before a bomb disposal expert arrived. Nothing to worry about, he said. The shell was empty.

"It scared me to death," Koerber admitted.

HOLLYWOOD—(NEA) — Exclusively Yours: Marilyn Monroe, Hollywood's "Movies Are Hotter Than Ever" kid, and 20th Century Fox studio are going "round and round" about her future career blueprints. The studio wants sexy Marilyn to alternate between low-brow comedies and high-kicking musicals, but she has dreams of some day competing in the Oscar race for the best-dramatic-actress award.
