

Senate Committee Urges Labor Unions To Take Tough Stand on Subversives

By WARREN ROGERS JR. WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate committee today in coupling a plea to unions to take out any Communist leaders with a call for tougher laws against subversives in organized labor.

The Senate internal security subcommittee headed by Sen. McCarran (D-Nev.) issued its report to the Senate on a four-day hearing at Salt Lake City last October into the leadership of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (UMMISW).

McCarran introduced such a bill in the last Congress but it died in a Judiciary subcommittee. The miners' union statement said McCarran "aims to wreck this union by the same methods he is using in his wild attempt to wreck the United Nations."

McCarthy to Probe Schools

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) said Monday that one of the first things he will do in the new Congress will be to investigate the nation's colleges in a search for subversive influences.

He said he'd rather use that expression than the bald word "Communists." McCarthy told interviewers for the weekly news magazine U. S. News & World Report that this was the first time he had discussed his projected plan of "going into the educational system."

The House committee denounced communism in some trade unions as "a national disgrace" and recommended repeal of a Taft-Hartley law requirement that union officials must file non-Communist affidavits.

COLUMBUS, O. (AP) — The strange story of the shanghaiing of an Alabama Negro at pistol point from Detroit and his lodging in an Ohio jail was disclosed last night as Michigan state police attempted to prevent the man's return to the South.

McCarran will be chairman of the Committee on Government Operations and the permanent Senate Investigating Committee. Rep. Velde (R-Ill.), who will head the House Committee on Un-American Activities, also expressed a desire to weed out any Communists from the nation's colleges and "all fields of education."

The House committee also recommended that spies and saboteurs be subjected to the death penalty in peacetime as they are in wartime. Wire-tapped testimony was admitted as evidence in espionage cases.

Death Claims Alex Barry

PORTLAND (AP) — Alex G. Barry, 60, long active in Oregon politics, died of a heart attack here Sunday night.

McCarran said he did not expect the work of his investigators to duplicate that of Velde's committee. He pooh-poohed any suggestion an inquiry into the nation's colleges would lead to though; controls.

The Senate subcommittee urged the Justice Department to consider prosecuting for perjury those officers of the Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers Union who signed non-Communist affidavits, as required by the Taft-Hartley law, and who were named as Communists during its October hearings.

Sawyer Names 1955 As Economic Year to Watch

By FRANK O'BRIEN WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Commerce Sawyer and a team of government and private economists predicted good business in the new year, a possible downturn in 1954 and a sharp economic test in 1955.

Commerce Department's Office of Business Economics after a six-month study in which other government agencies and the Council for Economic Development (CED) co-operated.

The report said businessmen plan expenditures in 1953, 1954 and 1955 for new plant and equipment close to this year's record level of nearly 7 billion dollars. The report cited this plus continued population growth, unmet needs for schools, hospitals and highway building, modernization and replacement, possible tax reductions, sizable individual savings, and social security benefits as major offsetting factors to slackened defense spending and any tendency toward recession.

But the report came up with the conclusion that bigger production and purchasing power are the keys to locking in a recession. The survey assumed international conditions and U. S. military goals in the next three years would not appreciably change. Because the economy is now more or less keeping pace with both civilian and military requirements, the report said, there will be neither a backlog of demand nor a letdown in 1955.

Draftee First Faces Long Test Series

(First of three articles giving a first-hand account of what happens to a draftee at an induction center.)

WASHINGTON (AP) — At 8:41 the sergeant began the roll call. To him it was just another morning at the induction center. But to the 197 men standing around him it was a personal D-day.

While you're here, you'll be processed to see whether you're qualified for military service. You'll be examined mentally, physically and morally.

During the next 4 1/2 hours they were to be examined to see whether they would be acceptable for military duty. What happened to them would have a good deal to do with how they spent the next two years of their lives.

One fellow told me he planned to attempt to get deferred as a college student until he was 26 when he would be too old to be drafted. He didn't know that if he got a deferment before he was 26 he could be drafted until he was 35 if the reason for his deferment ended.

"There's one thing I want you all to understand. Don't quit your job or break up your home until you're sure of when you're going to be inducted."

The place happened to be the induction center at Alexandria, Va., across the Potomac River from Washington. It could have been any one of 73 other centers around the country.

As a group, the men were like those going through other centers that morning. Ten were married. They averaged between 21 and 22 years old.

Then, we heard the steps of how we would go through the examination. The first thing would be the mental test. It would take about an hour.

Psychologist Defends Parents
