been the work of a crackpot, prankster or an ill-advised attempt to temporarily delay the Wilson's hanging.

The State Patrol immediately assigned two of its top investigators to search for the sender. Though calm as their last minutes ticked off, the Wilsons ate only half-heartedly after a lavish last meal had been served them.

TURMAN Turman, the older, mounted the gallows first. He dropped through the trap at 12:06 a.m., without having said a word.

Utah was asked if he was ready as he prepared to climb the gallows steps one minute later. "Everything is OK," he replied. "I am ready."

In nine minutes, both were dead. It marked the end of a case which set a state record for exhausting legal resources to spare their lives. The brothers were convicted June 28, 1950 and sentenced to die. Four stays of execution were granted by various courts, up to the U.S. Supreme Court, and by Gov. Lingle as their attorneys sought to gain a new trial or clemency.

The last chapter was Langlie's appointment of a committee of three lawyers recommended by the American Bar Association to check on all facets of the case. The governor, following the committee's report, refused to intercede.

"CAMAN" The brothers, from the little town of Camas on the Columbia River, were visited on their last day by their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Moses Wilson, and two other brothers.

Just before they were taken to the execution chamber, the warden delivered a telegram to Utah and Turman from still another brother, Rassi, an inmate at Oregon State Prison.

"My God always be with you and bless you. I love you with all my heart and I am always praying for you. May God bless you until we meet again, Rassi."

Utah and Turman were convicted on strong circumstantial evidence. A bottle found near the spot where the Dewey girl was kidnapped bore Utah's fingerprints. The brothers were arrested a few days later in Sacramento, Calif. They maintained throughout their trial they were in a Portland theater the night of the abduction.

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK CHICAGO (AP)—Hogs, cattle and sheep were quoted nominally steady on the livestock market Saturday.

Compared with a week ago, barrows and gilts ended 50 cents to \$1.00 lower while sows were mostly 50 cents lower. Receipts on Friday were the largest for that day in more than 15 years. Shipper buyers were usually active throughout the period.
