Infant Dies In Automobile

MOUNT SHASTA—Death of an infant in a car here Saturday morning was from natural causes and not car fumes, as at first believed, according to Coroner Lloyd Noble.

M-Sgt. Charles LaRoche, his wife and their 11-month-old twins, Jeffrey Allen and Joyce Ann, were en route from Camp Roberts, Calif. to Everett, Wash., where the sergeant is to do recruiting service. They stopped at a restaurant in the southern outskirts of Mount Shasta and the sergeant and Mrs. LaRoche went in to have coffee, leaving the twins in the car with the motor running.

When the LaRoche's returned to the car a few minutes later, they found little Jeffrey Allen had died. Coroner Noble said an autopsy showed death was caused by an enlargement of the thymus gland.

The LaRoche's home is in Virginia. The infant was buried here.

E.W. Carlton Rites Held

Two Prisoners Returned Here

Leonard T. Powers, 24, who was released from the New Mexico penitentiary at Santa Fe, New Year's Eve, is now in the County Jail here awaiting prosecution on a second indictment charging him with knowingly uttering and publishing a forged bank check.

He was brought from Santa Fe by Deputy Sheriff Dal Reed, arriving here Saturday.

Also brought to the County Jail was Richard Henry Jarvis, 18, charged with larceny of an auto. He was picked up at Santa Ana, Calif., where he was in custody.

Powers was released from the New Mexico prison on the condition that he consent to return here to face the check charge. He was serving a three-to-five year term there for obtaining property with intent to defraud, and prior to that, in 1948, was sentenced to the Oregon prison from Klamath County for forgery.

Jarvis is charged with taking a car from the Dugan and Meier car lot last September. He waived preliminary hearing in District Court this morning. Both he and Powers were expected to be taken into Circuit Court later today.

Jarvis was 17 at the time of the car theft, and after four days in the County Jail he was placed in the Juvenile Home, from which he escaped.

Building Tops Million Mark

New construction and remodeling inside the city limits of Klamath Falls during 1952 was worth \$1,149,475, according to the annual report of Building Inspector Vern Schoragen, to be submitted to the City Council tonight.

That was the total of 367 building permits taken out.

Among the 367 permits, the inspector reports, 27 were for new residences, with a total value of \$308,900, and nine for new business houses, worth \$235,550. The largest single permit was \$86,000, for a school improvement.
