Klamath Tribe Sets Up Fund For Members' Medical Care

A proposal to set aside \$75,000 for a year's trial at taking care of the medical, hospital and nursing expenses of members of the Klamath Indian tribe was agreed upon yesterday by the tribe's executive committee.

The committee met at Klamath Agency, and carried over its session until today to take up various other reservation matters.

Most of yesterday's discussion involved the long-pending question of reopening the Klamath Agency hospital, a subject that has met the disapproval of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, although the tribe has voted to operate the hospital again.

Currently it is being run just as an out-patient clinic.

Some members of the executive committee felt that the hospital should be opened despite the Indian Service opposition and despite any opposition that might be brought up from the medical profession in Klamath Falls, as a step toward showing the world that the Indians can take care of themselves.

Others felt that the hospital will be too costly and that it will never be reopened.

However, as a stopgap measure to provide medical and hospital expenses for the tribe, Warden Crawford's proposal to earmark \$75,000 of tribal funds to defray medical costs for all enrolled members, to be used to pay the bills for whatever doctors or hospital services the patient might want, whether in Klamath Falls or elsewhere.

The situation is now that the Indian is on his own in paying for his medical care.

To get the money set aside for that purpose, it will be necessary to attend.
