Provision for the scholarship money was contained in the will of Vivian A. Berg, who died earlier this year at her home in Coeur d'Alene, Ida. The check came to Dr. Vera H. Brandon, acting dean, from Miss Berg's brother, Maurice C. Berg of Spokane, executor of the estate.

Miss Berg had specified earlier the money be used to help deserving and needy young American women finance their home economics education at OSC. The "many kindnesses received on the campus and a recognition of the value of an education" prompted her action, Miss Berg said.
