Slip just over edge of door. Prevents scratches, makes a colorful soot... helps meet the growing demand for elimination of an all-white kitchen.

Rinse Gives Color Lift To Drab Hair

You need not go to extremes to add or restore glamorous color to your hair. While a temporary rinse can't radically change the tone as a dye job will, countless slight variations are possible depending on your hair color and the shade of rinse you choose.

You'll no longer have plain brown hair but a lively chestnut, golden-brown, brandy-brown. Your hair won't be plain black but raven, jet, ebony or blue-black. Blonde hair won't look anemic but golden or ash-silver. Hair turning gray can be blended in and all-over gray can be beautiful, rather than old-looking. These are just a few of the color possibilities.

You can change the highlight color at will. You can't change a dye job just by shampooing as you can a temporary rinse. Many girls will be happy to experiment knowing that fact.

A home dyeing job involves so many precautions that most girls feel they shouldn't try it. With a temporary rinse made by a reliable manufacturer, you don't have to worry about a lot of precautions. There's nothing that can harm you, the maker claims.

There are several ways to apply the rinse—by pouring it on from a cup, by brushing it in with a natural-bristle nail brush, and by using a long-nosed flexible plastic applicator. The last method is by far the easiest and most satisfactory, because you can squirt the color in just where you want it, without losing half the rinse down the drain.

After the shampoo has been thoroughly rinsed out and your hair is still wet is the time to use your color rinse. After application, rinse keep the color from rubbing off on towels, pillows and hats.

Let us say your hair is an uneven color, streaked here and there with blonde. It may be beautiful, depending on just where the streaks are and your own preference. If you don't like streaks, you can easily get rid of them by using a rinse to match the dominant tone.

If you have blonde hair with dark streaks, it's quite probably that you don't like the effect at all. In this case you use a blonde color rinse.

Bleached hair can look quite brassy, most persons agree. At the same time, many girls stick to this method as a sure way to achieve the blondeness they so

much desire. The too-dazzling effect can be softened with a silver rinse. Hair that has accumulated too much henna can be made a mink color with a dark-brown rinse.

A dye job that is growing out can be made less strange-looking with a rinse to match the color of the dye as nearly as possible. If your hair disappoints you after it has been dyed or you're just plain tired of the color, you can use double-strength rinse to make it more nearly your natural shade.

Brown or blonde hair turning gray is mousiest of all, and makes a woman's heart quake when she first sees it. No one else need know it is happening. You can blend in that gray until the day when your hair is all one color. When it is a solid color, you can make it an exciting gray by selecting from a choice of gray tones available to you in color-rinse form.

Eager Beaver Guests Washington Society

WASHINGTON — "Operation Headache" for the Eisenhower-Nixon Inaugural Ball committee is to keep the invitation list down and still keep friends. Even with the ball running in two election totals, 14,000 guests, there will be trouble.

The Eisenhowers will shuttle between the two sections of the ball. Invitations will be distributed on a state quota basis, with priority given to guests of President-elect and Mrs. Eisenhower and to requests from members of Congress, the Republican National Committee and top government and military figures. Members of Congress will be entitled to four invitations, two for themselves and two for guests. Single admissions will be \$12. Boxes holding eight guests will be \$300 per box.

The Inaugural Ball dates from the days of George Washington. The first one was held on a spring evening in 1793 in the City Assembly Rooms of New York. Some historians refused to recognize this as an Inaugural Ball since it came several weeks after Washington's inauguration. They declare the first Inaugural Ball in history was that of President Madison, March 4, 1809, at Long's Hotel, a boarding house on Capitol Hill.

Invitations to those in the Social Register, and the balls were sponsored by Dining Assemblies. During the Monroe Administration, these changed from purely social to civic affairs, where anybody who could buy a ticket could attend. These functions became so popular they sometime oversta-

dowed the inauguration ceremony itself.

MANY TRY
Increasing numbers sought to attend the balls, and when President Harrison was inaugurated, in 1841, three separate balls were held. The President put in an appearance at each. Two balls were given in honor of President Polk four years later.

Some 5,000 attended the second Lincoln Ball, held in the newly decorated Patent Office and historians report President and Mrs. Lincoln were caught in the crush when refreshments were served. So great was the crowd attending the first Grant Inaugural Ball at the treasury in 1869 that dancing was out of the question.

At the request of Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, who is said to have frowned on dancing, there was no ball in

1913 and none thereafter until the first Roosevelt Ball in 1933. A charity ball was held in connection with the Coolidge inauguration in 1925.

The welcome mat is out for the half-million visitors expected to attend the inaugural on Jan. 20. Committees Eisenhower Jan. 20 are preparing to take care of everything from lost children, broken bones, housing, feeding and protection from racketeers to showing folks an all-round good time.

Hospitality and housing committees have been set up to provide information and find lodging for the visitors. Residents of the city are offering rooms in their homes and apartments for those who haven't hotel reservations. It is expected some 30,000 beds outside hotels will be needed.

A "racket squad" is working to protect the public against schemes to use the inaugural to gyp the unwary. A medical aid committee is readying to provide first aid stations, roving ambulances and services to care for any emergency.

In the entertainment line something is planned almost every hour for the "big show" and the average American and his family, for the young and old. Some things will cost money. A lot of things are free. You have to have an invite to get into some parties. Some are open to anyone.

Highlight of the official entertainment for Sunday, Jan. 18, will be the reception at a hotel for governors of states and distinguished guests between 3:30 and 8 p.m. There will be music by the U.S. Marine Band orchestra and non-alcoholic beverages with cookies and sandwiches will be served. This is by invitation only.

Anyone with \$5 can take the tour of the embassies of Brazil, Great Britain, Norway, Korea and the Apostolic Delegation. Proceeds go to the National Symphony Orchestra, which will give a gala con-
