Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, met in the Ladies' Parlor of the First Presbyterian Church, Monday evening, Jan. 5.

Members were entertained by an interesting discussion of one of the current controversial books, 'The Iron Curtain over America,' by John Bealy, given by Mrs. H. B. Van Hoozen. This book is unique in that it not only discussed the internal decay and the external disasters which threaten the life of our country, but diagnoses the growing cancer of which they are merely the symptoms. Aggressively Christian and patriotic in his attitude, the author goes behind the iron curtain of propaganda and censorship to give his fellow citizens the first comprehensive documented account of the origin, the scope, and the intentions of the insidious forces working from within which are seeking to destroy America and Western Christian civilization. Mrs. Van Hoozen said. After a brief historical background of the communist movement, she discussed the things the average citizen can do to combat communism: always vote in all elections; use his constitutional right to express his opinion, both in speaking and in writing; inform himself about the powers of Congress and the other branches of the government and protest if he sees violations of these powers; aid in every possible way in cleaning up government, local, state and national.

Eva Burkhalter, regent of Eulalona chapter, presided during the business session. A letter from R.H.
