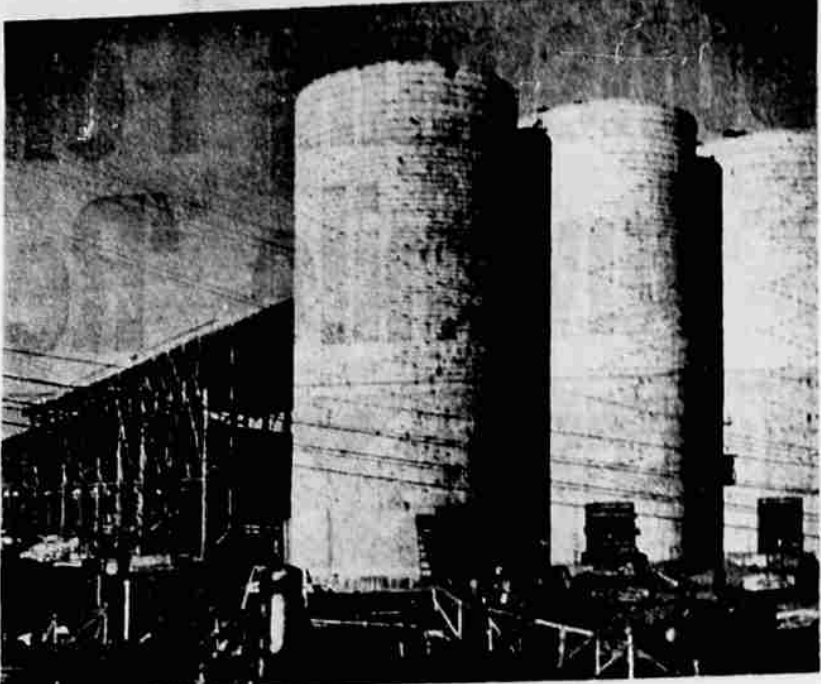

Joan Leslie Has Regrets Over Studio Legal Fight

HOLLYWOOD — "If I had it to do over again, I wouldn't do it!"

This was Joan Leslie talking about her epic four-year struggle to escape her contract at Warner Brothers. It has been a few years since she won her freedom, and she has had time to evaluate the experience.

You may recall that the actress sued to end her contract with the studio after she passed 21. Part of her reasoning was that she could void a contract entered into while she was a minor. The case was bitterly fought through various courts.

"I wouldn't do it that way again," she admitted. "I would have tried to settle the matter in a friendly way, without the bitterness. As it turned out, I won the case just about a month before my contract would have been over."

"I was able to do only three pictures in those four years. Naturally, that hurt my career. In this business you have to remain before the public or else you suffer."

Miss Leslie has done well in the job of rebuilding her career. She recently signed a deal for two pictures a year with Republic. The contract permits her to do outside films, and she is currently appearing with John Agar in a movie for the Ford Theater on TV, made by Screen Gems.

In the picture, she has a sequence which is a departure from the things she has usually done. She usually plays a "nice" girl (she has that adjective when applied to her). But in the TV film, she hangs her clothes on a lamp and takes a bath in a lake while the embarrassed Agar stands nearby.

"I've gone as far in this film as I ever have before in pictures," she remarked.

But she added emphatically that she has no desire to follow in the dainty footsteps of Hedy Lamarr and Marilyn Monroe.

"I'll admit I got a little tired of playing so many 'nice' girls at Warner's," she commented. "But I have no desire to play bag girls or get the sexy kind of build-up."

"As for men, they may get a thrill from seeing an exciting kind of woman on the screen. But fundamentally they like the kind of girl they would feel like marrying."

Crash Victims' Bodies Found

SEATTLE — Coroner's deputies Sunday recovered the remains of seven persons killed last week when a Flying Tiger Airline cargo plane crashed in a field 13 miles east of here.

The victims were found in the twisted wreckage of the four-engine DC-4 buried 15 feet underground. The plane crashed shortly after take-off Wednesday night after clipping the top of 1,930-foot Squak Mountain near Issaquah.

Coroner's Deputy Ted Harris said the impact drove the plane far into the ground. A power shovel was used to reach the victims.

Killed in the crash were Mrs. E. K. McLinden, 24, Sull Lake City, who with her two sons, Gary, 4, and Kelly, 5, caught a ride north from Burbank Calif., originating point of the fatal flight, the stewardess, Janet Woodmansee, 20, Santa Monica, Calif., and the crewmen, Co-pilots Charles E. Greer, 33, Worsen, N. J., and Budlong, Merrill, 40, South Pasadena, Calif., and Co-pilot Warren C. Lowe, Burbank, Calif.

Leon Cuddeback, regional head of the Civil Aeronautics Board's Bureau of Safety Investigation, said a preliminary probe showed the cargo plane struck trees near the summit of Squak Mountain as it was making an instrument approach to Boeing Field during a storm.

"I think Hollywood's biggest mistake is aiming at success. Whether you are an artist, a writer, a composer or a film maker, the important thing is to create as you see best."

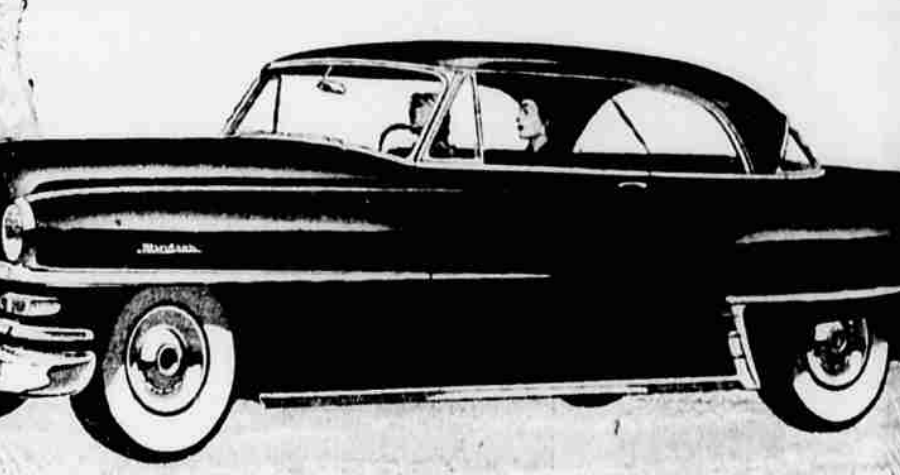
Even so, the financial success of "Bwana" represents a happy triumph for Oboler over his scoffers.
