

Struggle Against Commies Flares In South China

While no serious challenge to Red rule appears to have developed, the reports indicate at least that opposition still dares to gather.

Causes of the resistance are believed due to several factors. Transfer of Red Army troops north to Korea left many South China areas in the hands of wavering militiamen.

Secondly, the Reds are attempting to finish land re-distribution in South China. That reform usually generates much resistance.

Thirdly, coverage has been generated among non-Communist elements by Chinese Nationalist raids from Formosa. Some of the more optimistic folks on the Red main-land seem to view these raids as evidence Chiang Kai-shek is coming back soon.

Other probable causes of unrest include the fall collection of grain taxes and heavy Red restrictions along the China coast, which include strict regulation of fishermen. The regulations are so harsh that several hundred fishermen have fled to Portuguese Macau and British Hong Kong.

Among guerrilla activities reported by the independent Wah Kiu Yat Po was the seizure of "Bambud Patch Village" near Chungshan on Dec. 2 by villagers and defecting Reds. Some 300 Red soldiers later arrested 10 Communist workers, 50 villagers and 30 Red militiamen, the paper said.

Another guerrilla group in Kwangsi Province reportedly attacked three Red army units of about company (175 men) strength, and disarmed one unit.

Other evidence of Red jitter reported in dispatches from Canton included these:

More than 38,000 dependents of Nationalist government workers living in Kwangtung and Kwangsi Province are being exiled to Northwest China's Kansu, Tsinghai and Sinkiang Provinces. They will work in undeveloped areas.

In November, four Kwangsi Province guerrilla leaders were executed by Red Army firing squads more than a year after their surrender. After long "brainwashing" courses the Reds decided the ex-guerrillas were not good Communist material, said a dispatch from Kwilin.

Another prominent figure executed was Lin Yu-shu, former head of the Swatow Chamber of Commerce. He was shot at Chaoyang on Nov. 29 as a counter revolutionary after working on road gangs near Swatow since his arrest in April, 1951.

Dispatches to independent Chinese papers here say 180,000 persons in Fukien Province on the coast of South China have been "whot by the Reds in the last three years."

Such figures were viewed with caution here until recent Communist statements indicated they likely were accurate. The Reds have admitted two million persons were "liquidated" since the Reds came to power three years ago.

Two tracts southeast of Malin were leased to E. H. Taylor and Bud Fairclio, 142 acres, \$1,165, and to Bud Fairclio, 153 acres, \$244.

White Lake was leased to A. E. and Bertha McCoy, who bid \$1,165 for the 1,154 acres.

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King Seeks Swede Defense

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)—King Gustav Adolf VI called for additional steps to strengthen Sweden's defense and expanded social legislation in his speech from the throne Monday opening the new session of parliament.

The speech contained the parliamentary program of the Socialist-Agrarian coalition government.

The King said traditional neutral Sweden had good relations with foreign powers, but told the lawmakers they will be asked to approve plans for obtaining new material for the Army and armament for the Navy.

He urged scientists to pursue atomic research for peaceful purposes.

NEW YORK (AP)—The International Boxing Club, looking for a chairman of the organization, turned to other fields Monday following the rejection of the post by J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.
