the major investigative role. He said he favored a search for subversives in colleges but only where there was evidence of organized Communist groups.

The internal security subcommittee report, submitted under the expired chairmanship of Sen. McCarran (D-Nev.), said without going into details:

Testimony before the subcommittee indicated specifically that Communist activity took place among teachers in Philadelphia, Boston, Cleveland, Detroit, Buffalo, and Madison, Wis., as well as reflecting the certainty of substantial Communist activity among teachers in other areas.

Several universities also were cited in testimony as containing Communist units.

The subcommittee drew these conclusions in its report:

1. Despite the unquestioned loyalty and self-sacrificing devotion to duty of the preponderant bulk of America's teachers, there are yet many hundreds of teachers who are Communists.

2. Communist teachers radiate an influence much greater than their proportionate number.

3. The New York Teachers' Union is an organization that is an instrument of the Communist party and has been used to implement the Communist conspiracy.

4. Legislative committees either of the Senate or of Congress have aided local school authorities by sketching a pattern of Communist activities and by exposing Communist teachers.

5. A Communist is not a fit person to be placed or retained in a position to influence the minds of the youth of America.

Check Case To Grand Jury

After a preliminary hearing in District Court this morning, Joe Vinco, 37, of 2217 Gettle, was ordered bound over to await grand jury action on a charge of drawing a bank check with insufficient funds to cover it.

He is held in the County Jail and bail is set at \$1,000.

Vinco was arrested Jan. 7, charged with writing a \$200 check on Jan. 3. The check was given to W. H. Elliott, owner of the Waldo Valley State Bank, Dorris.

Edwin Corbin, 234 Autumn, a mechanic who was employed by Vinco earlier testified today that he received a check for \$200 from Vinco as his pay in December, and that he cashed the check at the Waldor.

It was returned and Elliott contacted Vinco to make the check good. Vinco allegedly gave Elliott on Jan. 3 a check for \$200 and \$40 in cash, to make good the \$200 check.

But the \$200 check was returned by the bank marked "account held responsible to return the remaining \$200 of the \$300 he had obtained by cashing the original check.

Corbin signed the complaint against Vinco.

Also testifying at today's hearing were Elliott and Jerry Swartz, man, bartender at the Waldor, and Merle Dale (house employe of the Dorris bank, who said Vinco's account for the Klamath Diesel Company was closed out by the bank Dec. 17.

Vinco was represented by Attorney Ben Goddard, and his defense testimony was given on the ground that no intent to defraud was shown, but District Judge D.E. Van Vactor overruled the motion and ordered Vinco bound over.

KF Man Held For Deer Kill

A second Klamath Falls man has been arrested in connection with the killing last Dec. 21 of five deer at the interstate field's winter grounds south of Tulelake.

He is Berford Vernon Healy, 42, a logger living at 410 S. 5th. He is held in the County Jail and bail is set at \$1,000.

Healy surrendered to State Police Saturday afternoon, by his attorney Clarence Humble, and was placed in the County Jail.

William Clay Johnston, 47, same address, was arrested last week and charged with illegal possession of untagged deer meat and deer skins.

Johnston pleaded guilty in District Court and is to be sentenced next Thursday.

A California game warden found where five deer had been killed south of Tulelake and determined that the carcasses had been brought into Oregon in a car he observed on the highway in that vicinity. The automobile was traced to Johnston, and the warden identified him as the driver.

Some packages of venison were found at Johnston's room, 418 S. 5th, when he was arrested.

State Police say the occupants of the car were Johnston and Healy, and that the deer were killed by Healy.

Healy was arraigned in District Court this morning, and given until next Friday morning to enter a plea. His bail was set at \$500.

Acheson Urges C To Aid Europe

NEW YORK (AP) - The New York Times says that Secretary of State Dean Acheson has made a personal appeal to British Prime Minister Winston Churchill to provide more leadership in Western Europe and the Middle East.

The Times, in a story from Washington by James Reston, said it is understood the plea was made at a private dinner at the British Embassy there last Thursday night.

Reston said others present in addition to Churchill and Acheson, were Gen. Omar Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, who will be under secretary of state in the Eisenhower administration, Aver

Man to Plea On Check Rap

Leonard Thomas Powers, 24, was arraigned in Circuit Court this morning on an indictment charging him with knowingly uttering and publishing a forged check, and it is to enter a plea Thursday at 11 a.m.

He was represented by Attorney J. C. O'Neill.

The check involved was cashed at Peterson's Market on Oct. 24, 1951, was drawn for \$48.52 and signed with the name of Randolph Jones, a Bonanza area farmer.

It was made payable to Powers. The youth's bond has been set at \$5,000, and O'Neill asked Judge David H. Vandenberg to reduce that to \$2,500, saying that Powers might be able to have that posted.

Judge Vandenberg said that if Powers were able to obtain surety for \$2,500 he would reduce the bond requirement.

Powers was brought here early this month for prosecution on the check charge, after being jailed Dec. 31 from the New Mexico prison at Santa Fe.

Moisture Falls At Crater Lake

Nearly an inch of moisture in the form of rain, not snow, had fallen on Crater Lake National Park since 10 a.m. yesterday, Chief Ranger L. Hallock announced this morning, and it was still falling there then.

Since Oct. 1, when stream measurements are begun, and recorded in the park, just .01 of an inch less than two feet of precipitation (moisture in rain and snow) has been measured in the park, he said.

However, Hallock said the rain had improved the shape of the roads, and all are open and travelable. There is 72 inches of roadside snow, as compared with 146 inches a year ago.

Over the weekend 33 cars brought in 115 people including 14 skiers to the park.

Chet Langslet, postmaster, and Hal Ogle, KFPFA supervisor, have been reappointed to continuing terms on the armory board, and Merle Loosley, Gerald West and Percy Dixon reappointed to the county dog commission.

ROSEBURG (AP) - Chester D. Crabbs, 24, indicted last Thursday on a charge of first degree murder, attempted to take his life last month by slashing his wrists, Police reported.

An earlier Associated Press story erroneously reported that William Coffield, 24, Vancouver, Wash., had made the reported suicide attempt.

Coffield is under arrest on a first degree murder warrant also.

Both men were held in connection with the slaying last April of Georgia Lucille Lang, 19, whose nude body was found in a wooded area 15 miles north of here Oct. 30.
