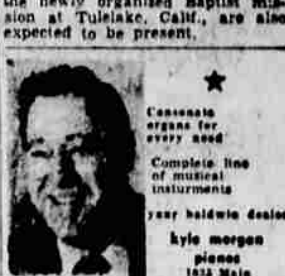
Baptists Slate Monthly Meet

People of the five Baptist churches of Klamath Baptist Association will meet at the First Baptist Church of Klamath Falls in their monthly meeting Tuesday night, as announced by Dr. E. M. Casey, moderator of the association.

Church members from Calvary, Altamont, Stewart-Lenox and First Baptist churches of Klamath Falls and the First Baptist Church of Dorris will have as their theme for Sunday School expansion the goal of the Southern Baptist Convention, "A Million More in '54."

This is the "kick-off" meeting for the local group of Baptists for the new year and is expected to be well attended by representative numbers of all the local church groups. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Mrs. J. T. Sismore, Sunday School specialist from Portland will speak to the meeting concerning the effort of the 28,000 churches of the Southern Baptist Convention to increase the number of people enrolled in the Sunday Schools by more than a million. The Rev. B. L. Milard, Grants Pass, missionary for the Southern Oregon area will show a moving picture. The new pastor of the Dorris church, The Rev. Everett Murray, will be introduced. Members of



the newly organized Baptist mission at Tulelake, Calif., are also expected to be present.

Missionary To Speak Here

Far East authority, Missionary John Schlosser, will be guest speaker at the Free Methodist Church, 1918 Oregon, Tuesday, 7:45 p.m.

Serving under the General Missionary Board of the Free Methodist Church of North America, the Rev. Schlosser was superintendent of China Missions until the Communist occupation. He then transferred to the Philippine Islands where he has since been working. Schlosser brings with him color slides of missions in the Philippines.

Born in China of missionary parents, Schlosser received his early education in that country. After graduating from the American School at Kikungshan he came to the States and took his A.B. at Greenville College, Ill., and the degree of Bachelor of Sacred Theology at New York Biblical Seminary. Upon his return to China he became superintendent of the China Free Methodist Mission. As the Communists moved in upon the Honan Province, he, with other missionaries, pioneered the opening of new work in Chungking, Szechwan Province. He was also worked in the third province of Shensi.

When he was forced by political conditions to leave China, he moved to Manila, Philippines, where for one year he broadcast daily in several languages over radio station DZAS for the Far East Broadcasting Company.

In 1950 he again pioneered a new field, this time on the island of Mindanao. Now on furlough from his work in the Agusan Valley, village of Lianga, Schlosser is on tour of the United States describing the advance work in this tropical area. Through Bible classes, evangelistic services, children's meetings and meetings in outlying towns, Schlosser seeks to present the Christian message to 28,000 people in the area immediately surrounding the town of Lianga. Missionaries in this primitive area are just ahead of a great population increase, according to Schlosser. They are laying the foundations of a civilization.

As a second-generation mission-

ary, Schlosser speaks with authority on the critical situation in China today, and the vast opportunities present in the Philippine Islands.

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
