## 2nd Trial For Remington

NEW YORK (AP)—The second perjury trial of William W. Remington, charged with falsifying a Soviet spy contract, was scheduled to start today after months of delay.

The federal court trial was expected to get under way without further delay or prosecution motions, which have led to postponement several times since last April.

Remington's new trial is based on an indictment containing five counts of perjury allegedly committed while he was on the witness stand at his previous seven-week trial here just two years ago.

Remington, 35, former \$100,000-a-year Department of Commerce economist, was convicted in February, 1951, on a perjury charge that he lied when he swore before a federal grand jury that he never had been a Communist party member.

In the fall of 1951, the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals here upset the verdict and ordered a new trial. The government then obtained the new indictment on which he now is to be tried.

Remington appealed to the U. S. Supreme Court for outright acquittal, but his plea was denied in February, 1952. This left the way clear for the new trial.

In addition to the charge on the passing of government secrets, Remington also is charged with lying in testifying that he never knowingly attended Communist party meetings, that he never paid party dues, that he never tried to recruit any one into the party, and that he did not know until 1951 that a Young Communist League existed at Dartmouth College, where he attended in the late 1920s.

The new indictment does not mention the original charge upon which Remington was convicted. The Appeals Court, in reversing this conviction, held that the previous trial judge, Gregory F. Neely, had been too vague in defining to the jury what constituted Communist party membership.

## Demo Senator Accuses Ike

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Neely (D-W.Va.) said today he sees "signs of Eisenhower begging off from his campaign promises" to press for more liberal social security benefits for the aged.

Neely said a Republican proposal to create a new Hoover study commission to look into social security and other problems "does not look anything like a move in behalf of the President-elect's pledges." Rather, he said, "it seems to offer an excuse for delay."

Sen. Ferguson (R-Mich.) and Rep. Brown (R-Ohio), after a visit with President-elect Eisenhower in New York yesterday, told reporters they will push their proposal to create the study group with former President Hoover as a member to "start where the old Hoover Commission left off." They have introduced resolutions in the Senate and House to set up such a 12-member commission.

Sen. Edward Martin (R-Pa.), a member of the Senate Finance Committee, which handles social security legislation, was told of Neely's comment and he said in an interview: "The Democrats oughtn't to criticize that way. The general is trying to carry out his campaign pledges to the best of his ability, and I know of no move by him to 'beg off' anything."

## Top English Music Star Starting New Film Career

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—This will be hard to believe in England, where he has long been the top musical star, but Jack Buchanan says he is carrying out a new career.

Buchanan's career has already won him fame and fortune in England, where he has starred on the stage and screen. Now he's taking a long-postponed whirl at Hollywood movies, with some TV tossed in for good measure.

"There's an entirely new generation which doesn't know me," said the tall, graceful musical star. "I'm desirous my new career to suit them."

A previous generation remembers Buchanan from the 1920s, with Gertrude Lawrence and Beatrice Lillie in "Chariot's Revue." He remained in England during the war, entertaining troops and operating his theater, the Garrick, through the worst German bombings.

After the war, he was tied up in England with commitments, except for a six-week replacement of Frank Fay in "Harvey" during the Broadway run. Having done two British shows in the last three years, Buchanan is now free to pursue his career on this side of the Atlantic.

His first assignment was a movie, "Bandwagon," with his old friend Fred Astaire. Set makers product he'll walk away with the flier, and producer Arthur Freed wants him to stay here for more films.

Buchanan's only other Hollywood film was "Monte Carlo" in 1930. "The loss said about that, the better," he said.

He hasn't done a British film musical since before the war. The English have had scant success with their tunefilms, except for party efforts like "Red Shoes" and "Tales of Hoffman." How come?

"One reason is the music," he commented. "I'd say the score is responsible for 60 per cent of a musical's success. Some British composers may get angry with me, but I must say that we just don't produce the scores that American shows do."

"For another thing, musicals are costly. They require maintaining a staff of musicians, directors, choreographers, designers, and so forth. The English studios can't afford that."

Buchanan scored a hit on his first big-time TV debut last week. He co-starred with Bob Hope on the "Comedy Hour" featuring with Hope and Bing Crosby in a musical number they had done previously at a London show. Buchanan has offers to appear on TV with Jimmy Durante and Tallulah Bankhead, but they may have to wait for his return from a business trip to England.

Meanwhile, said FCDA, the country's 27½ million automobile radio and 10 million battery powered portables should help.

## Civil Rights Bills Ready

WASHINGTON (AP)—Eight senators are introducing today eight civil rights bills based on recommendations of the Justice Department and the 1947 presidential commission, Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) said.

Humphrey said in a statement today that the bills did not include one on "equal opportunity in employment," but that he and Sen. Ives (R-N.Y.) planned to introduce such a measure soon.

Humphrey said the measures ready for introduction today covered such matters as poll taxes, making lynching a federal crime and tightening laws against some forms of segregation in transportation.

He said he was offering the bills with these senators as co-sponsors: Douglas (D-Ill.), Lehman (D-Lib. N.Y.), Magnuson (D-Wash.), Murray (D-Mont.), Neely (D-W.Va.), Pastors (D-Ill.) and Morse (Ind-Ore.).

## Four Denied Shore Leave

NEW YORK (AP)—Only four crewmen on the French liner Liberté, of 658 questioned by immigration officials, have been denied shore leave on the vessel's latest visit here.

However, 310 crew members remained to be questioned today. The Liberté arrived here yesterday and leaves tomorrow.

## West Urges Austria Pact

WASHINGTON (AP)—The three big Western Powers have again prodded the USSR to conclude a treaty with Austria restoring its full independence.

In essentially identical notes, the United States, Britain and France told Moscow of their intention to summon an early meeting of the four-power treaty deputies in London "for the purpose of concluding an Austrian treaty."

Efforts to settle Austria's status and end the occupation by the four powers have come to grief, after 358 other meetings, over the Russian demands and claims against Austria. The negotiations faded in to what the United States called a "sterile exchange of notes."

## Kaiser Steel Strike Over

FONTANA, Calif. (AP)—A day-old walkout of 66 crane operators ended yesterday at the Kaiser Steel Corp. plant here after drastically curtailing plant operations.

Details of the dispute were not given. A union official said it concerned incentive pay.

## CD Considers Communications

WASHINGTON (AP)—How would Americans get information and instructions during a bombing attack if power failure silenced their household radios?

To help answer that question, the Federal Civil Defense Administration said yesterday it is working with experts and the radio industry to develop a cheap self-contained receiver for mass production.
