Former Klamath Woman Awaits 33rd Operation

Mrs. Laura Malcolm, formerly of Klamath Falls and now living in Vallejo, Calif., faces a 33rd operation this month on one of her legs crippled when she was a few months old by polio.

Her right leg has already been amputated during the process of her many earlier surgical operations.

Mrs. Malcolm, a sister of Mrs. R. E. Hurlbut, Rt. 3, Box 382, Klamath Falls, had lived here for some time. Though crippled and in ill health, she studied in public schools until her health forced her to drop out. Then she attended night school and beauty college, and finally opened her own beauty shop here which she operated for two years, and later did the same in Richmond during World War II.

In an interview recently for the Vallejo News-Chronicle, Mrs. Malcolm passed along a message for persons overcoming physical handicaps: "Don't give up."

Crippled from her waist down, Mrs. Malcolm, nevertheless, has won numerous ribbons through her skilled needlework.

"I learned to crochet when I was nine years old," she told the News-Chronicle Reporter Mildred Schroeder. "It saved my mind."

An operation 11 years ago was attempted to remodel her right foot and ankle but was unsuccessful, and chronic osteomyelitis forced its amputation. However, a similar operation on her left foot in April this year was a complete success and "gave me a new foot," Mrs. Malcolm told her interviewer.

"I even wear two sizes smaller in a shoe after that operation," she said.

Mrs. Malcolm voiced appreciation of the National Polio Foundation and the Solano County leaders. She drives a specially equipped auto. Her husband, Howard, is a 20-year veteran of the Marine Corps and is currently with the Mare Island police.
