Export houses bought wheat following sale of a cargo of the grain to the United Kingdom.

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK
CHICAGO (AP) — Traders in hogs pounded into new higher price ground Monday as supplied numbers fell far below a week ago. Values ranged from strong to 50 cents higher. A top of \$13.85 a hundredweight was the best figure in more than 14 weeks.

Cattle were steady to 50 cents higher but sheep failed to make a market in early efforts.

Barrows and gilts generally sold from \$17.75 to \$19.75 and sows from \$15.50 to \$17.25. A few sows managed to touch \$17.50.

Choice to prime steers brought from \$25.50 to \$34.50 and a few loads were held for higher money. Good and choice heifers made \$21.50 to \$26.00 and a few loads also were held higher. Cows topped at \$16.50, sausage bulls at \$20.50, beef bulls at \$17.00, and vealers at \$31.00.

Estimated arrivals included 13,000 hogs compared with more than 18,500 sold a week ago; 18,000 cattle compared with more than 25,000 and 2,900 sheep compared with nearly 8,000 last Monday.

Umpqua River, which caused most of Douglas County's misery, also were falling after cresting at Roseburg, Winchester and Elkton.

In the Coos County area, 142 persons were evacuated from the Coquille Valley, where the water got up to the second floor of some houses. Another 60 persons were evacuated from other low-lying areas in the county.

EUGENE
Near Eugene, 350 persons were evacuated as the Willamette River rose to 12.8 feet early Monday. Flood stage there is 12 feet.

The Willamette began falling after that, it crested at Harrisburg at 12 feet just before noon Monday. Elmer Fisher, river forecaster, said the Willamette would crest at 24 1/2 feet at Corvallis, 4 1/2 over flood stage, at 2 a.m. Tuesday.

Downstream it will reach these levels: 26 feet at Albany at noon Tuesday; six feet over flood stage, 24 1/2 feet at Salem at 1 p.m. Tuesday; 4 1/2 feet over flood stage; 16 feet at Oregon City at 9 p.m. Wednesday; four feet over flood stage; and 18 feet, equalling flood level, at Portland early Thursday.

With the Columbia River also on the rise, Vancouver, Wash., can expect some flooding Monday night. The river will inch over the 15-foot flood stage there, but is expected to go only to 19 feet in the Kelso area, where the flood stage is 23 feet.

The rain swept on eastward, where Central and Eastern Oregon ranchers welcomed it. Nearly two inches of rain fell over the week end in the Prineville area. Prineville reported the rain has totaled 3.74 inches since Jan. 1, which is nearly half the annual average—and with 366 days still to go.

The heavy rain contributed to highway crashes over the week end in which five were killed in Oregon.

One car overturned into a water-filled ditch east of Portland, killing Kenneth Dean Davis, 28—a soldier just back from Korea—and Richard Alvin Kreefolsky, 21, both of Portland.

COLLISION
A collision west of Portland killed Willis Lee Keafin, 33, Sherwood, and his sister, Mrs. Lola Helen Weeks, 28, Seaverton.

Paul Edward Schuner, 35, Eugene, was killed when struck by an automobile as Schuner walked across a road at Albany.

In Northern California six lives were lost over the week end. Three of them were killed when a slide swept a railroad locomotive into the El River. The dead were P. C. Liscomb, engineer; T. R. Porter, fireman; and James Aure, brakeman, all of Eureka.

One man escaped. He was Jesus C. Sanzate, 34, South Fork, Calif., a laborer who was thrown into the river as the slide took the locomotive down a 45-foot bank. He grabbed a log, floated to a bridge, and scrambled to safety. He suffered shock and bruises.

At Orick, a flooded community 55 miles north of Eureka, Arthur G. Grantstrom died of a heart attack while fighting flood waters, and Robert Letley was drowned Saturday night. With communications cut off, there were no details on Letley's death. A sheriff's helicopter will try to remove the bodies of the two men.

An earth slide struck an automobile Sunday 20 miles east of Eureka, and killed George Crawford of Burnt Ranch.

his G. M. shaves in the hands of a trustee for the duration of his tenure in government.

Paul G. Hoffman, former Marshall Plan director who like Carlson was an early supporter of Eisenhower, said he thinks the Senate should confirm Wilson and that the law in question should be changed or re-interpreted.

Hoffman, on an NBC television program from Philadelphia, said it would be inaccurate to think that Wilson would be partial to G. M.

Taft, the Republican Senate leader, has said he likes a suggestion for enactment of a law under which a department head could step aside and ask the President to appoint someone else when his own firm is involved in contract negotiation.

Wilson has asked for another chance to testify before the committee. Chairman stationer (H. Mass) indicated he expects the cabinet decision to tell the group Wednesday that he would disqualify himself in any G. M. matter.

Any such testimony by Wilson, plus a possible change in the law, seemed likely to satisfy most of the Democrats and Republicans who have been objecting to his confirmation.

Unless some move of this kind is made, Sen. Gore (D-Tenn) said in an interview, he doesn't think the Senate will approve Wilson.

On the other hand, Sen. George (D-Ga) said if the matter can be cleared up, he for one, will be glad to see a businessman at the helm of the Defense Department.
