

Owls Open OCC Play Tonight

Pels Divide With Cavemen

Medford Next For Klamaths

The Klamath Pelicans are all even after Saturday night's loss to Grants Pass, 69-52, and start drills tonight to face the district-leading Medford Friday and Saturday in a crucial road trip for the Pels.

Saturday night's loss gave the Pels a split with the Cavemen. The Klamath team won 53-52 Friday night.

Meanwhile, Medford was sweeping its series against Ashland with a 62-42 Saturday night win.

The first quarter was close Saturday but then Gary Mark scored late in the frame to give the Cavemen a 15-14 lead, the visitors were ahead to stay.

They headed into the second quarter with a 17-14 lead and stretched it to 33-23 at the half.

The Pels made a serious bid to catch up early in the third quarter and closed it to 31-36. Again in the fourth period, Jim Dougherty, Don Mills and Clinton Mills hit in that order and Doug Pence added a free throw to narrow the Cavemen's lead to 51-56. But Grants Pass started its stall at this point and picked up four free throws with the Pels fouling in an attempt to gain possession of the ball.

Don Reese, Grants Pass' high scorer and one of the district leaders, was blanked but Sam Dean and Mark took up the slack with 15 and 14 points.

Larry Yarnell paced the Pels with 13. Every Pel player — 12 of them — edged into the scoring column but it wasn't enough.

Huskies Seem Cinch To Grab Cage Title

Oregon State Saturday night, downing the Beavers 68-56. Washington took the Friday night game 78-63.

The Huskies take to the road this week, facing last-place Washington State in a pair of games at Pullman, Oregon State also will be travelling, tackling Idaho Friday and Saturday nights at Moscow.

Oregon, in the runnerup spot after splitting a pair with Idaho 79-76 and 57-75, steps out of the conference to play the University of San Francisco at Eugene Friday and Portland University at Portland Saturday.

WIN FIVE
 Washington will take a 6-0 conference record and 13-1 mark for the season into the two-game series at Pullman. The Washington State Cougars, who have won only five games in the 1952-53 season, took their 18th loss Saturday, bowing 56-66 to Gonzaga in a non-league contest at Spokane.

Washington, paced by lanky Bob Houbrege, who collected 23 points, was never able to catch up. The Huskies, led by 45 per cent of his tries against Oregon State, while the Beavers made good on only 35 per cent of their attempts.

Coach Slat's Gill assigned two of his Beavers to 6-foot-7 Houbrege and one to Joe Cipriano, who was dead in Friday night's game. That gave 6-foot Doug McClary virtually a free hand and he added 20 points to Washington's total.

The 23 points scored by Houbrege gave him a six-game conference total of 176 and 254 points for Washington's 14 games this season — an average of 25.3.

Oregon grabbed an early lead over Idaho at Moscow but faded in the face of a Vandal scoring spurge in the second quarter and was never able to catch up. The Vandals, behind 14-17 after the first quarter, led 40-26 at the half, and 55-44 going into the final period.

Harley Kruger led the scoring potting 20 points for Idaho. Ed Halberg was high man for Oregon with 18.

In the Southern Division, Bob McKeen scored 24 points for California as the Bears downed Southern California, 71-63 Saturday. The Bears took the Friday game 78-63.

UCLA, fighting to stay in the race, took a couple of close ones from Stanford, 67-66 and 74-71.

 NEW YORK (AP)—Passing becomes more important than shooting in college basketball this week — examination time is here again.

More and more of the nation's college squads will be hitting the books instead of the boards between now and the first of the month. And in coaches' offices aspirin consumption will rise while the mentors sweat out the professors' verdicts.

The Ivy League has quit cold until Feb. 4 and the rest of the conference and independents are tapering off fast.

Actually, conference competition isn't very far advanced most places although the season as a whole is about half over. Most of the conferences don't hit their stride until late December.

Not one of the 14 conferences which automatically qualify their champions for the NCAA postseason tournament has a cinch winner as the full approaches.

The Skyline Six probably comes the closest with Wyoming out in front — six victories without a loss. Wyoming journeys west for week-end games against Brigham Young and Utah and could have the crown virtually wrapped up by Saturday night.

Beton Hall, the nation's only major unbeaten team, remains the class of the Independents with 18

straight, Memphis State visits the New Jersey club tomorrow night and it looks like No. 19 coming up.

The conference picture generally looks like this:
 Ivy—Cornell (4-0 in the league), a surprise leader with Columbia (2-0) coming fast. No games this week.
 Southern—Wake Forest (6-0) on top but North Carolina State (8-1) still the big threat.
 Southeastern—Louisiana State (4-0) plays at Georgia tonight but can't lose the lead since second-place Florida (3-1) doesn't play this week.
 Southwest—This conference, as usual, is running on the theory that any boy can be president. Texas and Baylor (3-1) currently tied for the lead.
 Border—Hardin-Simmons (4-0) is being pressed by Arizona (3-0).
 Pacific Coast—California (5-1) looks the best in the Southern section with Washington (6-0) topping the class up North.
 Rocky Mountain—Idaho State (8-0) and Western State (2-0) head the list.
 Big Seven—Oklahoma (3-0) can't seem to do much outside the league but it's out front among the home folks so far. But don't overlook Kansas (3-1), the defending NCAA champion, or Kansas State

(6-1), leader in the AP poll the past three weeks but upset by Kansas Saturday night, 80-66.

Missouri Valley—Tulsa (2-0) and Oklahoma A. & M. (1-0) are the leaders. Tulsa plays twice this week, at Wichita Wednesday and Houston Saturday. The Angies, idle in the conference, tackle DePaul at the Chicago Stadium Friday in one of the week's brightest games.

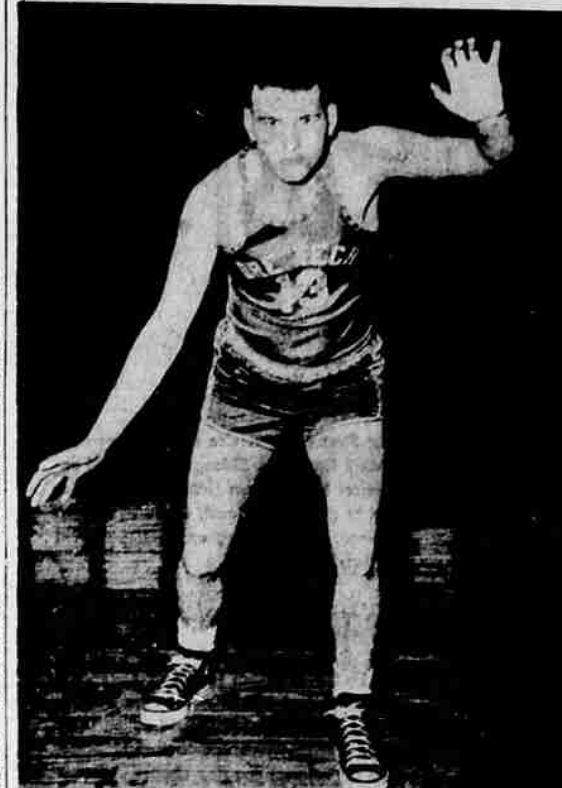
Big Ten—Indiana (7-0) consolidated its lead Saturday night with a double overtime 74-70 triumph over second-place Illinois and meets Purdue tonight.

Mid-American—Miami (Oxford, O. variety) and Ohio University are tied at 4-1.

Mid-Atlantic—Pennsylvania Military College (3-0) and Delaware (2-0) pace the field in the Southern section and Lebanon Valley (3-0) in the Western of the conference, which was one of four added this year to the automatic qualifying list.

Yankee—Connecticut (2-0) out in front up east.

Saturday night was a rough one for the top teams. Besides the upsets of Kansas and Illinois, third-ranked La Salle bowed for the second time this season to De Paul, 80-62, and Western Kentucky, No. 10 in last week's AP poll, fell victim to Eastern Kentucky, 78-60, in a little state feudin'.

E. Oregon Here For Two Tilts

The Owls of Oregon Tech start playing for keeps tonight when they host Eastern Oregon College of La Grande in the first of two Oregon Collegiate Conference contests on OTI's mile-high court.

Tip-off time is 8 o'clock.

The Mountaineers are fresh off four games against Southern Oregon College of Ashland. The Raiders won them all. The Owls, on the other hand, split even in four games with the Raiders, indicating the series will be a dogfight.

Eastern Oregon will have two high-scoring forwards on the firing line, Lowell Kolbaba and Larry Pryse. Big Bob Adrian, ex-Portland State cager, is at center while the guard choices will be picked from Gene Fox, Ken Westenskow and Jerry Poyser.

The Owls will answer Eastern Oregon's Kolbaba-Pryse scoring combination with a couple of forwards of their own who are not shy in the scoring department, Jerry Wyatt and Tom Schubert.

It's likely Keith Thompson will open at center, Len Gestin and Walt Butler at guards, although Art Kirkland hadn't definitely settled on his starters this morning.

The Owls go into the two-game series (tonight and tomorrow night) with six victrols in 13 king-a-X games.

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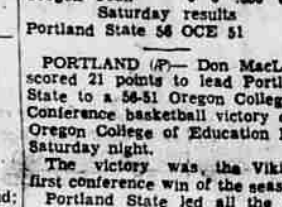
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
