 sought permission to buy various items they were questioned about sources of supply and the possibility of bids.  
 One major purchase was quickly approved however. It was for a \$600 drier attachment for the city's "Patchmobile," a unit used for street patching. City Engineer Thomas explained that the drier would greatly speed up patching work. Councilman Wendell Smith, chairman of the Street Committee, immediately moved to approve the purchase and it was unanimously approved.  
**REPAIR**  
 The city engineer said the continued rain had greatly hampered street repair work but that it would be started on a larger scale as soon as possible.  
 By ordinance, the council approved sale to City School Board No. 1 elementary schools of several city-owned lots adjacent to Conger school. The lots are to be made into a recreational area to be used jointly by the schools and the city Recreation Department. Selling price for the half interest was \$1,200.  
 Councilman Jimmy Barnes supported Fire Chief Roy Rowe's argument that new doors should be installed on the front of the central fire station. Building Inspector Vern Shortgren said the present doors were completely worn out. Rowe said the new doors would probably cost about \$800.  
 A complaint signed by several residents in the vicinity of 1149 Pine Street charged that a vacant residence at that address was a fire hazard. The council instructed Building Inspector Shortgren to confer with the owner on possible removal of the old house. Shortgren said he did not yet know the owner.

 day, was dry Tuesday.  
 The State Highway Commission reported that in addition to the slide at Brighton, the Coast Highway was cut south of Sea Lions Cave and from Coquille to the California line. It reported Highway 99 open, but said that high water or slides kept these routes closed: South Santiam, Umpqua, Siletz, Albany-Corvallis, Old Columbia River and Wilsonville Ferry Highway.  
**ROADS**  
 There were innumerable back-area roads closed. S. E. 82nd Avenue, one of the routes from Oregon City to East Portland, was under four feet of water at one point in Clackamas County.  
 Phone lines were hard hit. Telephone service at Coos Bay and other Southern Oregon coastal points were out suddenly and company spokesmen said at mid-day the cause had not been located. A slide near Depoe Bay took out all but one line between Newport and Tillamook.  
 Some parts of Salem had a brief power loss from high winds, and Corvallis was hit by a tornado that cut all power, ripped out trees, broke windows, slashed at roofs, but hurt no one.  
 The Southern Oregon coastal points below Coos Bay continued isolated and two Greyhound buses with 28 passengers were still at Gold Beach Tuesday. They had been there since Saturday.  
 An amateur radio report said Tuesday morning rain along the southern coast was coming down "about as hard as it can."

**Bike Bandit Gets Away**

**ST. LOUIS (AP)**—A 12-year-old boy caught up with a fleeing gunman last night only to lose his bicycle, thus inadvertently helping the man escape in a comedy of errors.  
 It all began when the man entered a confectionery in midtown St. Louis, pulled out a gun and demanded money.  
 A customer entered. The gunman courteously let the store owner wait on the customer, but the owner, Joseph Eno, took advantage of the open door and fled down the street shouting.  
 The gunman fired at Eno unsuccessfully.  
 Nearby residents began pouring from their homes. The gunman fled in the other direction with the crowd in hot pursuit.  
 Patrolman Emil Boulicoult saw the mob running toward him shouting, "Stop thief." He pulled out his gun but couldn't tell who the culprit was.  
 With a rush the would-be bandit and crowd was past him so Boulicoult ended up chasing the chasers.  
 Then James Nations, 12, mounted on his trusty two-wheeler, took over.  
 But one push from the gunman and the boy was on the ground while the fugitive rapidly peddled away from the panting crowd.  
 The bicycle was found later but not the gunman.

**Response Favorable To Ike's Speech**

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—Dwight D. Eisenhower's first message to the nation as its new President was praised by both Republicans and Democrats Tuesday, with the reservation by a few that it was not specific.  
 The new chief executive's prepared inaugural address was lauded by members of Congress in such terms as these: "Dignified... magnificent... courageous... thoughtful and correct."  
 Several Democrats saw in the speech, which dealt almost entirely with foreign policy, little more than a re-statement of the principles which they said have guided the outgoing Truman administration.  
 For example, Rep. Richards (D-SC), top Democrat on the House Foreign Affairs Committee, called the address "a clear and courageous exposition of what our foreign policy should be and what it has been during the past administration."  
 And Rep. Walter (D-Pa) commented: "It's very encouraging to see that the President will carry out those wise policies of the previous administration that have prevented global war."

Sen. Bridges (R-NH), senior Republican member of the Senate, said that "with a simplicity which is the hallmark of eloquence President Eisenhower set forth the creed of his administration."  
 "His principles are those to which all Americans, as well as the citizens of the free world, can adhere," Bridges said.  
 Said House Majority Leader Halleck (R-Ind): "It was a magnificent presentation dealing with the problems confronting the country."  
 House Minority Leader Rayburn (D-Tex) said: "I agree with President Eisenhower that we should continue to make ourselves strong economically and to such an extent from a military standpoint that international desperados and aggressors will fear to attack us."  
 House Speaker Martin (R-Mass) commented: "It was an inspiring message for peace and understanding among nations, as well as an appeal for higher morality and greater devotion to the country and its ideals. The people will receive it as a much needed tonic."  
 Rep. Gross (R-Iowa) said "the message deals in generalities," and he added: "I'm waiting to see him get down to specifics and present a specific program to Congress."  
 Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Tex., the Democratic Senate leader, implied that he too wanted more details. Johnson called the inaugural speech "a dignified statement of the dreams and aspirations that motivate millions of people," and he continued:  
 "The country is eagerly awaiting the program which he will follow in steering us through the difficult days that lie ahead."

**Mamie and Pat Have Top Day**

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—Two women—Mamie Eisenhower and Pat Nixon—who have seen high honours come to their husbands, will remember this day as one of the proudest of their lives.  
 At noon they watched Dwight D. Eisenhower take the oath of office as President of the United States and Richard M. Nixon the oath as vice president.  
 Next to the incoming President and Vice President these two women are the ones the huge inaugural crowds want to see. Both women realize this and they have carefully planned what to wear during the day's crowded events—subject to changes depending upon the weather.  
 For the early church service, Mrs. Eisenhower chose a black silk suit with a white hat made "by someone in Arlington, Va." and sent her last week as a gift. Mrs. Nixon also chose black with an off-white hat.  
 Both women also decided on grey suits for the inaugural ceremonies on the capitol steps. Mamie's is a new suit of pale grey. Pat's is a darker grey, one she has had for some time. Pat got a new hat of "winter white" and Mamie's hat is of light grey felt with a small brim. It has cut-outs through which a green felt lining can be seen.  
 The next big event is the dual inaugural balls. The two women, of course, have new gowns.  
 Mamie's is of renoir pink tulle, a silk with a grained texture. Two thousand rhinestones have been sewed onto the gown. Pat's gown has a silvery aquamarine brocade bodice and a flaring skirt of aquamarine tulle.
