Diversified Farms

In 1940 the national depression, naturally, had an effect on the expansion of agriculture but it did not influence the economy sufficiently to stop an increase, year by year, in the volume of production. However, the year 1940 marked the beginning of a new era of expansion which has continued steadily, on a stable basis, keeping pace with the decrease in the timber industry. From the cash return of \$8,864,646 in 1940 this increased production gave a return to the farmers of \$22,773,300 in 1945. An impetus was no doubt given by the demand for foods occasioned by the nation's war economy during that five year period. That year the return from potatoes was \$9 million dollars and beef, alone, brought an additional amount of over four-million dollars. Almost one-third, or 32.5 percent, came from the California area.

LIVABILITY A FACTOR

Today, there are 1,294 modern farms in Klamath county that produced agricultural crops during the year 1951 that contributed 63 percent to a cash return of \$39,379,809; the balance coming from the adjacent California area. Livestock and livestock products accounted for \$11,035,450 and farm crops brought in \$28,344,359. Beef and potatoes—two of the basic food products of American families—were the leaders with the value of beef being \$7,465,000 and potatoes brought in \$12,414,547. Grain production was a close second to these two major farm products accounting for \$9,019,430.

While scientific agriculture and diversification of products has been a major factor in this advancement, credit should be given to the livability of the farm homes in this region, for a part of this success, coupled with the pride of ownership and recognition of the farm population in civic matters.

Today the farm homes in Klamath county, in the main, have the same modern utility services that are enjoyed by their urban neighbors. Automobiles, radios, telephones, electrical appliances, schools etc., have created a cultural environment which has brought the farm families into town.

FARMS ARE ELECTRIFIED

There are, today, 1,179 farms that are electrified with 1,158 of the 1,294 farms in the county getting electricity direct from power lines. The majority of the farm homes have electric ranges, hot water heaters, electric washing machines and smaller electrical appliances that please the farm housewives. For example there are 1,026 of these farms that have automatic electrically operated water pumps and many have milking machines, feed grinders and lighted barns. These electrical appliances give the farm women more time to associate with their children and neighbors.

Stable crops are produced in this region as well or better than anywhere else in the nation. Irrigation has played an important part in this stability. There are, today, 255,000 acres of land on which supplemental water is used. This water is taken from the Klamath river and gravity circulated, by

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Tank Blast Kills Two

LONGVIEW, Wash. (AP)—Two workmen were killed and six others injured Monday in the explosion of a pressure tank at the Longview Paper Co. pulp and Kraft paper plant here.

Steam-pulp from the 60-foot-high metal "blow tank" gushed over a wide area as bottled-up steam let go with a mighty roar, shattering windows over the plant's 125 acres. The blast was felt in the Longview business district 2 1/2 miles away.

Other workmen were endangered by flying bits of metal and glass. Plant officials said the casualty list might have been higher but for a truckdriver's shouted warning.

A G. Beebe, Longview, said he heard a loud "pop" just after he backed his truck against legs supporting the tank. Beebe and five others ran to safety as "a whole bunch of stuff" began falling around them.

Thomas A. Long, 59, a Longview millwright who was one of a crew of eight installing a pulp-shredding machine in an adjoining building, was instantly killed. B. E. McDaniel, 39, a Kelson welder, died about two hours later.

Injured were R. C. Carriker, 42, B. E. Easton, 32, Lorne Mauldin, H. S. Baker and Archie Potts.
