## Niven Switches to Wolf With Aid of Flynn Agent

**HOLLYWOOD**—David Niven, never known as a Hollywood wolf, is making sure he is an expert one for "The Moon Is Blue."

He's got Errol Flynn's former press agent working for him.

Niven won't say whether the hiring of Flynn's press agent is any more than pure coincidence but admits that it's nice to get pointers from one who has watched the master at work.

"You know," commented Niven, "I haven't had a personal press agent since early in my career. I was broke then, heavily in debt and my career was in bad need of a shot in the arm. So I hired a publicity man. He turned out to be too good. The next day a gossip columnist headlined 'David Niven Buys 150-Foot Schooner.'"

"Soon my tailor, butcher and baker were on the phone, all screaming, 'Where's that 20 bucks you've owed me for six months?'"

Thus ended one of the shortest publicity campaigns in Hollywood history.

Besides hiring Flynn's ex-publicist, Niven prepped for his role of the wolf in the movie version of Broadway hit by touring in the West Coast company of the play.

Otto Preminger, the producer-director of both the play and the movie, and F. Hugh Herbert, the author, wanted Niven to tour with the play with the idea of playing the same role in the movie later on.

"They apparently didn't consider me a natural-born wolf type," commented Niven.

The company of "The Moon Is Blue" started shooting this week with two separate casts—one English-speaking and the other German. As the Hollywood troupe finishes their scene, the German counterparts step in and do the same scene in German.

"There's a million good reasons for this," Niven said. "A German gross of one million dollars more than normal can be expected when German actors are used."

## Death Claims Brodie Twin

**CHICAGO**—Tiny Roger Lee Brodie, Siamese twin who for 34 days amazed the medical world by surviving a head-to-head surgical separation, died last night.

The 16-month-old boy had been in a deep coma since the history-making operation Dec. 17. His brain circulation was impaired and his condition had been listed "very precarious" since the separation from his brother Rodney Dee.

Attending physicians had expressed amazement that he survived the 12 hour and 40 minute operation.

The surgery on the twins, who were born joined at the top of their heads, was the first time in medical history the patients had survived such an operation.

Rodney, since the separation, has undergone two plastic procedures to put skin over his brain. He has shown some signs he is on the road to recovery. However, he must undergo further surgery and his condition still is regarded as critical.

"Roger's death was not an unexpected development by any means," said a spokesman at the Neuro-Psychiatric Hospital of the University of Illinois.

The spokesman said attending physicians had explained several times that Roger's chances of recovering consciousness were "virtually nonexistent."

"The child had received minute-to-minute care since the operation," he said. "Feeding through the nose tube continued on a half-hour schedule until a few minutes before he died."

"His condition had gradually worsened, almost imperceptibly. There was a definite indication of sinking during the day, a gradually slowing pulse rate."

It was during the twins' separation that surgeons discovered there was only one superior sagittal sinus, the main passageway or vein draining blood back from both brains. Because Rodney was holding up much better during the marathon operation and surgery in his favor could be more easily performed, he was favored for "survival of the fittest" by the surgeons. They gave the sagittal sinus and most of the brain covering to Rodney and took the bigger chance on Roger's survival.

Parents of the twins, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Brodie, were informed of Roger's death late last night through a relative as they have no telephone in their farm home near Moline, Ill.
