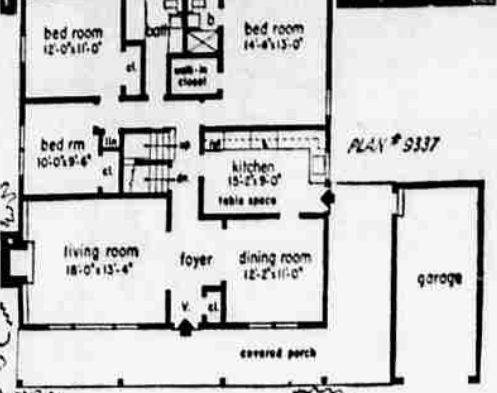


HOMES FOR AMERICANS

High Arch In Fashion

Eyebrow lines have come through many fashion phases—the no-brow look which is hardening and takes away from expression, the high Dietrich type of curve, and the soft arch. Fashion's favorite today is the high arch, almost pointed; the brows are kept natural-

ly thick or made to appear thick, with pencil.

If you have the suggestion of an arch to your brows and want to give yourself a more provocative look, take a sharp pencil in black or brown — whichever matches your eyebrow color — and cheat just a little on the height of the arch. Too much height added will look artificial, but with experience you can learn to add just the right amount.

Fill in any blank spots with short brow line if it seems too short when you look at it in profile. Give a tiny lift to the end of the eyebrow, for all lifted lines lend a youthful look.

The straight, thick eyebrow is also fashionable. A girl lucky enough to have it is smart not to try to give herself an arch. To do so, she must pluck a great deal and reshape her brow line, though this has been done by some Hollywood studio make-up departments, it is highly impractical for general use.

With the natural look so fashionable, we may hope to see less and less of the practice of girls giving themselves work and pain to change their eyebrow lines.

Most eyebrows do need some plucking, however, to remove stragglers underneath the line and hairs that grow between the eyebrows. If this is necessary in your case, rather your eyebrows well with a small shaving or complexion brush before beginning. The soap will prevent irritation and infection and make the hairs lie flat.

Have a magnifying mirror and good light. Pluck out the superfluous hairs at an angle, in the direction of growth. Before pulling, make sure that the tweezers are firmly gripping a hair follicle, or your skin will be bruised. Wipe off the lather and smooth the eyebrow line for a final inspection.
