Cookies That Sparkle Easy

Delicate and very crisp, with macaroon-like glistening top, and nice round even edges... very professional in every way... are these sparkling almond rounds. Mix the dough right in the saucepan, after you have browned the butter or margarine.
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/4 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
1 egg
1-3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon each mace, cinnamon, salt
1-3 cup finely chopped unblanched almonds
Brown butter or margarine in 1 1/2 quart saucepan; remove from heat and add shortening, stirring to melt. Then blend in beet or cane sugar and almond extract. Beat in egg with spoon. (Mixture will thicken and become smooth.) Mix in sifted dry ingredients and almonds. Use teaspoon measure to take out pieces of dough; form small balls and drop into a dish of beet or cane sugar; roll to coat well. (It's the sugar that gives the sparkle, the crackly-crisp top.) Place sugared balls about 2

inches apart on greased cookie sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375 F.) about 10 minutes or until light golden brown.
Makes about 4 1/2 dozen 2-inch cookies.
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There's a softer, more feminine look about the new spring fashions, there's a look that will flow and drape with ease. These are the fabrics (rayon crepe is one) that are shirring, fine pleating and tucking. Such fabrics best express the return to the look. They suggest the leisurely charm of afternoon tea or the pleasure to be wearing a flattering dress for dinner or theater-going. They indicate a life that still has the graciousness so often swallowed up in the rush of hectic comings and goings. A pale pink appears (left) in this delicate crepe dress with shirring to encase the fullness, lay blue crepe (right) is shaped and fluted so that it seems entirely as if substance poured over the figure. The pleating is fine and narrow with rippled seem to spring from within the fabric. This is pure line, unadorned. Accent comes in buttons at the surplice neckline and fake hip pockets.

The next meeting is to be held at King Hall, Feb. 19. The meeting will be led by the county agent, Dolores Bracken.

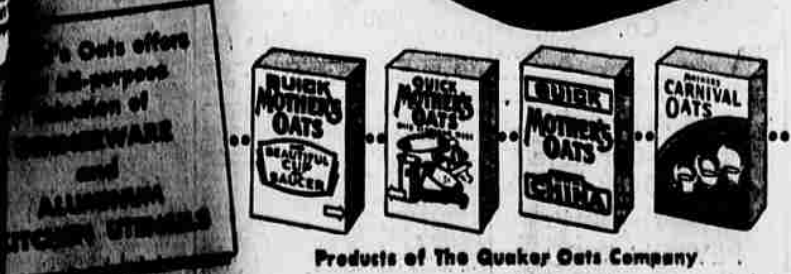
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
