CHICAGO GRAIN CHICAGO (AP) - Grains sold off in the morning and then staged a slow recovery in the last part of Friday.

The early sell-off, which developed on a renewal of liquidation, carried all wheat contracts to new seasonal lows. Other cereals, however, held above their lows.

Weakness of wheat was attributed largely to uncertainty regarding the international picture, with the international wheat agreement scheduled to end on July 31 and Great Britain planning to restore the importing function to the private trade.

Wheat closed 1/4 lower, March \$2.29; corn 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher, March \$1.82 1/2; oats 1/4 higher, March 80 1/4; rye 1 to 1 1/2 lower, May \$1.82 1/2; soybeans 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher, March \$2.94 1/2; and lard 3 to 18 cents a hundred pounds lower, March \$9.30.
