PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The Pasadena Playhouse — training ground of such movie stars as Dana Andrews, Victor Mature, Robert Young, Randolph Scott and Eleanor Parker — was the scene of a \$3,500 Sunday robbery carried off according to reports.

The victim, box office treasurer George B. Hawes, was bound and gagged with adhesive tape. He knocked a receiver from a wall telephone, kicked off a shoe, dialed the operator with his big toe, and mumbled through his tape gag for help. Police arrived in four minutes.

Hawes, 31, told the officers he was entering the theater about 11:30 a.m. when a man said behind him: "Go on in and don't turn around. This is a holdup and this is a gun."

On the man's orders, Hawes opened the safe and then put his face and hands on the counter. After robbing the safe, the man bound Hawes' hands behind him, forced him to lie on the floor and put tape across his mouth.

Hawes said he was required to keep his back toward the robber at all times.

Rita, Aly 'Still Good Friends'

RENO (AP) — A solemn Rita Hayworth, who maintains she has no romantic plans, gets her Nevada divorce today from Aly Khan, playboy Moslem prince she married after a whirlwind, globe-girdling courtship in 1949.

The onetime dancer turned glamorous movie queen said she expects to take her and Aly's 3-year-old daughter Yasmin to the Washoe County Court hearing.

She declined to smile for photographers. She wouldn't discuss either the divorce or Aly, sport-loving son of the fabulously rich Aga Khan.

Jackson Leichter, Rita's business manager, who accompanied her from Hollywood, explained: "She feels that is in poor taste — a matter to be discussed only with the court."

He added that no financial settlement has been reached with Aly concerning Yasmin, for whom Rita once asked three million dollars. But he said the possibility of future settlement for the child is still open.

"Miss Hayworth, of course, never

has requested anything for herself," Leichter declared.

Rita qualified for the divorce more than a year ago by establishing the six-week Nevada residence at a rented home overlooking Lake Tahoe.

She separated from Aly less than two years after they were married at his French Mediterranean villa in May, 1949. The romance — and subsequent domestic troubles — made news around the world.

Aly had pursued her across two continents, although she was still married to Orson Welles.

Then, after a year and a half of pleasure-seeking around the continent, Rita called it quits with Aly, explaining she couldn't stand the pace he set. Besides, she didn't want to give up her film career.

Divorce plans and rumors of reconciliation had alternated much of the time since then.

Only last summer Rita and Aly met in France and were seen together at Paris gatherings.

But she returned to her movie career alone, insisting she and Aly remained only good friends.

One Hollywood Actress Doesn't Want to be Star

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Marjorie Hoshelle is one movie actress who doesn't want to be a star. Her reasons are simple enough: One star in the family is enough.

Marjorie is the wife of Jeff Chandler and the mother of their two girls, Janie, 8, and Dana, 3. She is also an actress in her own right and is currently playing an "Eve Arden type" role in "Dangerous Crossing."

She is in the peculiar position of wanting to act but preferring not to be too successful at it. This sounds odd, but she has her reasons.

"I like acting because I've done it all my life," she explained. "I did a lot of pictures before I was married to Ira (Jeff's real name). Our first daughter came in the first year we were married, so I had to quit the business entirely. It was a hard adjustment for me to make."

"Being a wife and mother was a whole new world. I learned to cook and sew and work in ceremonies and other things that I found very interesting. But I missed the stimulation of acting; so I have gone back to it on a limited basis."

"I want to do good parts, but I don't want to work too often. My children mean too much to me; no matter how good your help is, a child still needs a mother's care. I have no ambitions to become a star. Our family life is complicated enough with one star."

The Chandlers were separated some time ago, but have since worked out their problems and become reconciled. Hollywood buzzed that her ambitions for a career were the source of their troubles.

"Ira and I both laughed when

we read those reports," she commented. "We both knew that was far from the truth. He has never been against my working."

"Our troubles were the same that hit any marriage. We came to a point where we had to make an adjustment to each other. It was complicated by the new kind of life we were living. We made the adjustment and now we are happy again."

The Chandlers married in 1946 after he got out of the Army. He went into radio acting and rose rapidly. Then came the movies and his first ascent to fame after playing Cochise in "Broken Arrow."

"Naturally, it changed our life," Marjorie declared. "We ceased to have the freedom that we used to have. We found that out when we decided to go out to a drive-in to eat one night. We took the two girls along, and it was going to be a outing as a family unit."

"While we were parked in the drive-in, five different strangers came up and conversed with Ira. We realized that we no longer had a family unit in public."

"It's the same thing when we try to plan a vacation. There are so many places Ira can't go now, because he knows he won't have any privacy. And he's the kind who can't refuse any requests; he's obliging to everyone."

But she added that his stardom also has decided advantages, principally the increase in revenue and the satisfaction of being a success in his chosen field.

One thing is a bit confusing about Marjorie — her last name. She is known professionally as Hoshelle. Her legal married name is Grosell. Jeff's real handle. But the fans and her newer friends know her as Mrs. Chandler.

"So when I recall anyone on the phone I always say, 'This is Marjorie Hoshelle Grosell Chandler,'" she said.

Pope Said Improved

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Pius XII, suffering from bronchial pneumonia, was reported slightly improved today. Vatican sources already had said there was no cause for concern.

No official bulletin was issued today on the condition of the 76-year-old Pontiff, who has been in bed since Thursday. His ailment at first was described as influenza but Vatican sources confirmed yesterday it was bronchial pneumonia.

No official information has been released on the treatment. Sources at the Vatican said, however, it could be assumed that such modern medicines as penicillin were being administered.

The Pontiff's persistent fever late last night hovered around the 101 mark. His doctor, Prof. Riccardo Galeazzi-Lisi has been staying at the Vatican since Friday to be more readily available if needed.

The Pontiff's attention to church duties continued despite his illness. He has been receiving his pro-secretaries of state regularly for discussion of church affairs. Yesterday he listened to mass celebrated by a member of the Vatican household in a small studio adjoining the Pope's bedroom in his Vatican apartment. He also recited the rosary for the return to Italy of war prisoners reported still held in Russia.

Never robust, the thin and ascetic Pope has been troubled frequently with bronchitis in the past.

He appeared weary at the great public consistory of Jan. 15 in St. Peter's Basilica at which he placed the red hat on the heads of 17 of the church's 24 new cardinals.

After that, despite cautions, the Pope maintained a heavy schedule of audiences — private, special and general, including meetings with the pilgrims who had accompanied the new cardinals to Rome.

Bank Robbery, Killing Muled

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Police today sought a possible link between the slaying of a young couple and a \$49,000 bank robbery.
