CHICAGO (P) - Hog trading took an uneven course Monday with butcher weights steady to 25 cents higher and sows steady to as much lower. Cattle were steady to 50 cents lower, heavier steers and heifers showing the decline, while no sheep market was established early.

Most barrows and gilts sold from \$17.75 to \$19.25 but others moved up to as high as \$19.50, the top price, paid for a double dressed. Sows were \$15.00 to \$17.00 mainly. Clearance was good on the 13,000 hogs on sale.

Good to prime steers sold upward from \$21.50 to \$24.25 and one high prime load reached \$36.50. Good and choice heifers were taken at \$21.00 to \$25.00. Cows topped at \$15.50, bulls at \$19.00 and vealers at \$22.00.

A holdover of more than 1,500 head of cattle from last week, running mostly to steers in heavier weight, helped to depress that part of the market out of line with other classes.

While sheep failed to sell early, bidding was lower in the face of a week end accumulation of 6,500 head, far ahead of the 2,375 sold a week ago.

Other estimated arrivals included 17,000 cattle and 300 calves.

general terms, covering both domestic and foreign issues.

Eisenhower's inaugural address was devoted largely to his view of the foreign situation and his ideas about meeting the problems it presents. He has not gone into detail on domestic policies.

Wilson encountered - that they are substantial stockholders in firms with defense contracts.

Asked right after the White House meeting whether Eisenhower still planned to make formal nominations of Stevens and Talbot, Taft said:

"Well, he hasn't sent them up (to the Senate). It is up to him to decide."

But later, at the Senate, Taft told newsmen he did not expect any nominations of subordinates until action on Wilson's nomination. He said he presumed there would be formal nominations then.

Taft said he believed Talbot and Stevens were waiting for final action in the Wilson case before coming forward with any proposals as to their stockholdings.

While the debate was on, Sen. Hendrickson (R-N.J.) sent a statement to newsmen saying he would vote for Wilson's confirmation but would "not be bound to any future course of action upon nominations which may fall into a similar category and which are not met with in the same forthright and courageous manner."

Hendrickson's statement appeared to be an indirect reference to Stevens and Talbot. Stevens is a multi-millionaire New Jersey textile manufacturer.

They reportedly have been advised by senators they had better agree to sell their industrial holdings if they want to be confirmed.

Eisenhower has not yet formally nominated them.

One senator said an exception might be made in the case of Stevens, to permit him to retain his holdings in a family-owned textile firm. However, the senator said Stevens would have to present a statement by Wilson saying that, if that firm ever transacted business with the government, the matter would be taken out of Stevens' hands.

Roger M. Kyes, chosen by Wilson to be his chief deputy, and Robert Anderson, named for Navy secretary, already have cleared up the matter of their holdings. They await formal nominations for expected Senate approval.

Taft wouldn't disclose in advance any details of the legislative program to be discussed with Eisenhower. But he indicated he expected guidance on what issues the new President wants Congress to consider first.

Potatoes

POTATO MARKET JAN. 23

At Portland the potato market was unchanged.

At San Francisco there were too few brokers sales of potatoes to quote prices.

At Los Angeles the long white potato market was about steady and the russet potato market was dull. Carlot and trucklot sales of russets from the San Joaquin valley, U. S. No. 1 A grade, brought 4.50 a 100 pound sack. A few sales of Idaho russet potatoes, U. S. No. 1 A, brought 4.25 to 4.50 a 100 pound sack. Small russets from Idaho, U. S. No. 1 A, were as low as 4.00 a 100 pound sack.

At Chicago today the potato supply was liberal. The demand was slow and the market was dull to slightly weaker. Track sales of Idaho russets, U. S. No. 1A, 15 to 25 per cent 10 ounces and larger, washed, brought 4.75 to 5.00 a 100 pound sack. Unwashed russets, brought 4.60 to 4.85 a sack. Street sales of U. S. No. 1A and generally good quality Idaho russet potatoes brought 5.25 to 5.50 a 100 pound sack.

At Yakima, the potato market was very slow and dull. There were too few sales to quote prices.

At Idaho Falls, potato offerings were rather light. There was a light wire inquiry. The market was very slow and dull. There were too few sales to quote prices.

Track holdings at the 16 major cities of the nation today amounted to 1232 cars. This compares with 979 cars one week ago. Arrivals at the 16 cities were reported at 367 cars. This compares with 350 cars arriving one week earlier.

Total shipments of potatoes throughout the nation yesterday amounted to 846 cars. Of this number the Pacific Northwest shipped 265 cars. Idaho moved 232 cars, Oregon 21 and Washington 12 cars.

Police Report Suicide Case

Death of Gordon Ash, 39, at his Crescent Lake home Saturday, has been officially put down as suicide, State Police here said today. Ash died from a pistol wound in the heart.

The State Police had been questioning Ash about a morals case involving a 17-year-old girl. Ash was not in custody and had not been charged in connection with the morals case.

As the officers talked to Ash and his wife at their home, Ash asked if he could speak to his wife alone. The officers stepped outside the small home. Then, according to Mrs. Ash, her husband went into a upstairs bedroom and a moment later the door was heard. Ash was dead when an ambulance arrived, police said.

Stores Face Brand Charges

Charges of selling unbranded foods have been filed against seven local butchers and meat shops, resulting from tests made by F. P. Black, food inspector for the State Department of Agriculture.

And a charge of selling adulterated meat was made against one of those a Merrill butcher shop doing business as Carl's Superior Foods.

The stores involved in the "unbranded food" merchandising apparently violated the Oregon state law unknowingly. Meat being sold by the firms contained sodium benzoate, which was an ingredient in a meat-color preservation which was sold to them by a Portland firm in the preservative business.

The local butchers said they did not know there was the unlawful chemical in the meat. Oregon is one of the few states, they said, which prohibits its use in meat. It is used extensively in some soap concoctions.

The district attorney's office said the charge against the Merrill firm resulted when tests showed ground meat being sold there was being adulterated with cereal to increase its bulk, thus lowering its quality.

Unbranded charges involved the firms, the district attorney's office said: Trulove's Market, Kalina's Food Market in Medford, Fraser's Market, Oregon Food Store No. 4, Woods Superior Foods in Klamath Falls and in Merrill, and Dean Hall's Lockers.

McKay Returns To Office

WASHINGTON (P) - Secretary of the Interior McKay, still a little weak after a bout with influenza, worked at his office Monday for the first time since being sworn in.

The secretary had a cold when he took his oath at the White House with seven other cabinet members Wednesday. And he remained in bed Thursday and Friday, missing the first meeting of the Eisenhower cabinet.

McKay said Monday he expects to confer with Ralph Tudor, a California Engineer, Tuesday. He declined to say whether Tudor was in line for appointment as an assistant secretary, but said he was an excellent man for such a job.

19 Killed In Plane Crash

ROME (P) - A two-engine Italian airline making its last flight from Sardinia to Rome crashed in flames Monday in the mountains east of Cagliari killing all aboard - 15 passengers and four crew members.

The DC-3 passenger plane crashed into the Simna mountains 10 miles east of Cagliari's Elmas Airport 10 minutes after taking off on its morning flight to Rome.

Carabinieri rushed rescue parties to the scene but it took hours to reach the burned wreckage in the isolated mountain district. Reports back to Cagliari said no survivors were found.

Rail Strike Hits Western

CHICAGO (P) - A strike by U.S. men who run the trains halted operations yesterday on the Chicago Great Western Railway, mainly a freight carrier serving five Midwest states.

Edward T. Healy, vice president and general manager of the railroad, said traffic was being shifted to connecting lines and a possible strike had been cleared before the strike.

Some 800 members of five unions struck over an accumulation of 600 claims and grievances, some said to have been pending 30 years. The disputes ranged from pay rates to sanitary conditions on cabooses.
