Fishing Rule Changes Told

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon's fishing regulations for 1953 are only slightly changed from those of last year.

Trot season dates and bag limits remain the same, the State Game Commission reported Saturday in announcing the new regulations which go into effect Feb. 7.

The season will open May 2 in all areas except Zone 1—coastal waters—and Zone 2—the Willamette, Sandy and Hood River waters—where the opening is April 18. The season will close Oct. 11 for all zones.

Fishing waters in the Willamette were extended to Oregon City Falls to a line from the southwest corner of the Bonneville Paper electric dam to a point 20 feet downstream from the Crown Salsbach tailrace. All other trout fisheries are the same.

Areas closed to boat fishing include the Alsea River above the mouth of Mill Creek, and Lake Umatilla, a Snake River tributary above Goodwood Cove.

Fish Lake in Linn County is closed to all fishing and Lake Umatilla in Klamath County is closed May 20.

Klamath closure dates on the Klamath River were changed to the taking of silver salmon. Tillamook River salmon was moved upstream to Creek.
