Philippines Defense Boss Breaks Red Guerrilla Try

MANILA (AP) — The most intense campaign ever directed by the government against the Communist guerrilla movement, but the Red leaders are not yet ready to surrender and call it quits.

To regain dwindling strength, stepped last year in their worst setback since World War II, the Reds apparently have turned to sabotage and infiltration.

Officials blame a rash of recent warehouse fires in the main cities of the Philippines on the Communists. Most of the goods destroyed have been important dollar-earning lamp crops ready for shipment.

Communist documents recently captured also disclosed new orders for infiltration among students in the country's universities and colleges.

The man chiefly credited with breaking the back of the Huk military and forcing them to change tactics is National Defense Secretary Ramon Maguway.

Revitalizing the Philippine units, he moved to crush the Communists at a time when they were knocking at the gates of Manila and threatening to humble the government.

Maguway has done more to clean the guns in this "show window of democracy" in the Far East than any of his predecessors. The success of his efforts is reflected in government figures.

Since taking to the field on April 1, 1950, the Philippine armed forces claim to have killed 5,319

East Gets Cold Snap

A bitter chill blanketed Eastern United States today while southerly winds warmed up the nation's midsection from Texas to the Eastern Great Plains and Missouri Valley.

Arctic air lay from the upper Mississippi Valley to the Atlantic Coast. It was below zero in Michigan—22 below at Pellston—and temperatures were below freezing in the Southeast.

Sharp northerly winds and snow flurries heightened the discomfort from New England to West Virginia.

It was cooler in the Pacific Northwest, and scattered showers were reported from Seattle to San Francisco.

U.S. Plane Output Told

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's aircraft industry will produce 14,000 military airplanes this year, more than in 1951 and 1952 combined, says J. E. Pease, president of Republic Aviation Corp., said today.

And sometime during the year, Pease told the American Legion Auxiliary Commission in a prepared address, the aircraft industry will become the nation's largest employer of manufacturing workers.

Pease said Russia still will out-produce the United States in airplanes this year, but the United States will be far ahead in quality of planes and pilots.

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Army to Study Case of 65th Regiment

WASHINGTON (AP) — Why would soldiers, with a proud record of valor in combat, suddenly disobey orders and refuse to fight?

That is the underlying question in a coldly legal issue coming up for formal review by the judge advocate general and the Military Court of Appeals.

It is a puzzle that taunts the Pentagon high command as well as the Korea field command. The answer could be the key to what some officers call "a great pity"—the courts martial of 91 men and one officer of the 65th Puerto Rican Regiment for refusing to attack a Communist position.

Army headquarters is reserving opinion until full details arrive. Perhaps Gen. J. Lawton Collins, Army chief of staff, will get some details first hand on his current visit to the battlefield.

But some officers, including some who saw the 65th fight courageously through the long early months of the Korean War, suggested factors that might have contributed to the paradoxical situation.

Rotation, it was suggested, might be an indirect cause.

The 65th Regiment, a unit of the 3rd Infantry Division, landed in Korea in November, 1950, just five months after the fighting began. Its officers, commissioned and noncommissioned, had been in the regiment for years and spoke Spanish as well as English.

This is important, not only because it made verbal orders easier to understand, but because it built a closer camaraderie from privates to brass.

But with rotation the regiment lost many of its bilingual leaders.

Then, last October, in the thick of a fight, two companies were ordered to continue counterattacking Chinese Communist positions. A regimental spokesman said a number of men withdrew without orders and other men, out with a patrol, slipped back to the main line.

Refusal to obey orders in battle is a serious offense. It can cost the lives of other soldiers, as the Army charges it did in this case.

The sentences imposed by the court martial in Korea ranged from dishonorable or bad conduct discharges to a 10-year imprisonment in one case. Four were acquitted and another case is pending. The review of the court martial action is automatic.

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pulled out of the line after the incident, "retrained" and sent back into action.

The case is the second of similar proportions in the Korean War.

Early in the campaign, charges were brought against a number of men of the 24th Regiment of the 25th Division for refusal to fight, described in the crisp talk of fighting men as "bug out." The 24th was composed largely of Negro troops.

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
