 HOLLYWOOD — (NEA)—Exclusively Yours: Olivia de Havilland and Joan Fontaine on the screen together for the first time?  This was the fourth time in four weeks the court had intervened to prevent Rubenstein from being taken into custody on a deportation warrant growing out of his World War II conviction of draft dodging.  
 The arguments Feb. 27 will be on an appeal from a ruling last Friday by U. S. District Judge F. Dickinson Letts denying Rubenstein's application for a temporary injunction.  
 Judges Henry W. Edgerton and David L. Bazelon said there was a serious legal question whether the attorney general has authority to haul Rubenstein off to Ellis Island.  
 They stressed that the financier has been at liberty on bond throughout the long deportation proceeding against him, and that government attorneys did not raise any issue of security.  
 But Judge Charles Fahy said he would not intervene. He explained that Rubenstein, if taken into custody, could test the legality of his detention by applying for a writ of habeas corpus.  
 The various legal moves by Rubenstein's attorneys, beginning Dec. 30 when he was supposed to surrender, are designed to keep him off Ellis Island until they can contest in the courts the legality of the deportation proceeding.

## 81-Year-Old Star Started Career

 HOLLYWOOD — What is left for a woman who is widowed at 67?  
 "All I could look forward to was a life of dinner parties and teas," says Mrs. Gertrude Hoffman. "So I decided to be an actress."  
 That was almost 20 years ago. At 81, Mrs. Hoffman is still leading a busy life as a film actress, and her friends and family never cease to wonder.  
 For 33 years, she was happily married to Ralph Hoffman, founder of the Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History. Then the naturalist was killed during an expedition to the Channel Islands off the California coast. Her three children had grown and left home and she couldn't face an inactive life in Santa Barbara.  
 "One of my daughters, who had been living in Europe, hurried home with the intention of making her home with me," she recalled. "I had quite a time convincing her that I really wanted to go to Hollywood to be an actress. Usually it's the other way around: The daughter wants to leave for the world life."  
 So Mrs. Hoffman came to Hollywood, only to face the heartbreak of most film newcomers.  
 "For nine months, I made the rounds of the studios," she said. "I would get furious when a script of a boy with his feet on a desk would say 'Nothing today, Gertrude.' They all told me I had to have an agent to get a job. The agents said I had to have a job to get an agent."  
 Finally she landed a part in a Warner Oland film at RKO. From then on she earned a comfortable living with her portrayals of grande dames, although one of her most noted roles was a lifer in the prison film "Caged."  
 At 81, Mrs. Hoffman has started a new career—TV. She has been playing a leading role in the Gale Storm-Charlie Farrell series "My Little Margie." This can lead to pretty strenuous things.  
 In a recent chapter she and Gale were crashing Hollywood. Mrs. Hoffman was dressed in a clown's outfit with a puffy nose, and the pair had to race down a studio
