

# Seton Hall Stays Poll-High

## Huskies Third In AP Vote

NEW YORK (AP)—Seton Hall, rolling along as the nation's only undefeated major college basketball team, was voted No. 1 team in the nation today for the second straight week.

The powerful Pirates, who made Memphis State victim No. 19 during the week, were voted tops by 44 of the 85 sportswriters and broadcasters in the poll.

They piled up 679 votes on the usual basis of 10 points for first place, 9 for second, etc. for a comfortable margin over second-place Indiana. The Hoosiers, runner-up for the second straight week, received 12 first-place votes and 595 points, while Washington held third place with a dozen firsts and 545 points.

La Salle, which led the poll for the first two weeks only to be supplanted by Kansas State, clomped past the Midwesterners this week. La Salle took over the fourth spot, shoving Kansas State down to fifth.

Illinois, still without a first-place vote, held sixth place, but all was confusion below that. Fordham jumped back up to seventh from 10th, moving Oklahoma A & M down a peg. Western Kentucky, which last night walloped Tampa, 117-58, took over the ninth position and De Paul, a 53-47 victor over Oklahoma A & M last week, became No. 10.

Out of the select circle were North Carolina State, which lost by 70-69 to North Carolina, and Kansas, 72-66 victim of Colorado. N. C. State is 12th, Kansas 14th.

## Spivey Jury In Deadlock

NEW YORK (AP)—The perjury trial of William Spivey, onetime All-America basketball great from the University of Kentucky, ended early today with the jury unable to agree whether he had a role in the big college sports scandal of two years ago.

The jury of eight men and four women, after deliberating more than 10 1/2 hours, reported itself deadlocked and then was dismissed by General Sessions Court Judge Saul S. Streit. The trial began Jan. 14.

While defense attorneys announced immediately they would ask for dismissal of the indictment, there was no indication what Dist. Atty. Frank S. Hogan had in mind concerning a possible new trial.

Spivey, seven-foot center who was the top scoring ace of the crack University of Kentucky team in 1950-51, issued a statement through his attorneys saying he was "disappointed" that the jury did not return a verdict, but was "satisfied" that a majority of the jurors were for acquittal.

## DEADLOCK

It was learned that the panel had deadlocked at 9 to 3 for acquittal. Of the 32 players at eight schools involved in the college basketball scandal, Spivey was the only one to stand trial. The others either pleaded guilty or turned state's evidence, but Spivey steadfastly denied ever discussing a "fix" before a game or taking a bribe.

He stood on this denial when he went before a New York County (Manhattan) grand jury about a year ago. The result was an indictment charging he lied on both counts, that he had discussed a "fix" with gambler Jack West and that he had accepted a bribe.

West is one of the 25 fixers named in the scandal. He and several others now are in prison. The 23-year-old Spivey repeated at his trial, testifying in his own defense, that he had no part in the basketball scandal.

## WITNESSES

Key witnesses against him were two former teammates, Walter Hirsch and Jim Line. Both Hirsch and Line testified that Spivey had discussed with them to rig the score of a Kentucky game during the 1950 Sugar Bowl activities in New Orleans, and they added that Spivey received \$1,000 for his part in the alleged deal with West.

The players allegedly did not agree to lose the game but to keep Kentucky's winning margin within the limits—the so-called "point spread" set by bookies in quessing odds before a game—necessary for West to win his bets.

Line and Hirsch both admitted, under cross-examination, that their testimony varied on some points with their grand jury statements. Hirsch conceded that he told the grand jury he did not believe Spivey ever got money for a "fix."

## Nardico 'Fighter Of Month'

NEW YORK (AP)—Danny Nardico, the busy Tampa, Fla., light heavyweight who knocked out Jake LaMotta, is rated "Fighter of the Month" for January in the copyright monthly ratings of Nat Fieischer, editor of Ring Magazine.

Eddie Chavez, San Jose, Calif., who upset champion Jimmy Carter in a non-title fight; welter champion Kid Gavilan, who whipped Vic Cardell, and Gil Turner, an easy winner over Bobby Dykes, all drew attention by their work during January.

Turner's win over Dykes moved him into first place among Gavilan's contenders and Chavez moved from 10th to fourth place in the lightweight rankings.

The Ring ratings list Randy Turpin of England, the ex-champ, as the No. 1 in the middleweight scramble for Ray Robinson's vacated title. Bobo Olson of Honolulu drew the No. 2 spot, followed in order by Charles Humes of France, Rocky Castellani of Luzerne, Pa., and Ernie Durando of Bayonne, N. J.

Despite Harry Matthews' announcement that he is to be considered a heavyweight, Ring rates the Seattle fighter No. 3 in the light heavy contenders behind Joey Maxim, the former champ, and Philadelphia's Harold Johnson.

Bobby Dykes, formerly No. 3 in the welters, was ranked No. 8 in the middleweight because he no longer can make the 147-pound limit.

Bob Erlanson paced the Creamery attack with 22 points as that team took an early lead and were in front, 36-22, at intermission.

But Erlanson was second best to Dan Mahoney, ex-Sacred Heart cage star, who canned 23 points for Hilltop.

That's the same number Dick Lundsten collected for Payless and Al Bellotti threw in for the Jayhawks.

## Binney Calls Sports Meet

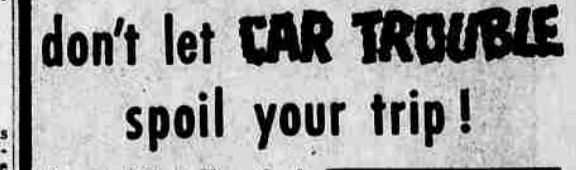
