material which in turn treats the animal. USDA Entomologist Bob Hoffmann, Corvallis, has set up a half dozen such stations throughout the county, and has made the preliminary checks. He plans to make checks in 30 days and in 60 days to determine the insect counts on the self-treating animals as compared with those which are treated other ways.

According to County Agent J. D. Venz, and by the Fall of 1963 recommendations should be out. Cost of de-lousing this way, he says, should run about 50 cents per 100 head of cattle per month.

Hoffmann is also working on control of hornflies, horseflies, cattle gnats and cattle lice, as well as mosquitoes—all bugs which affect animals and men.

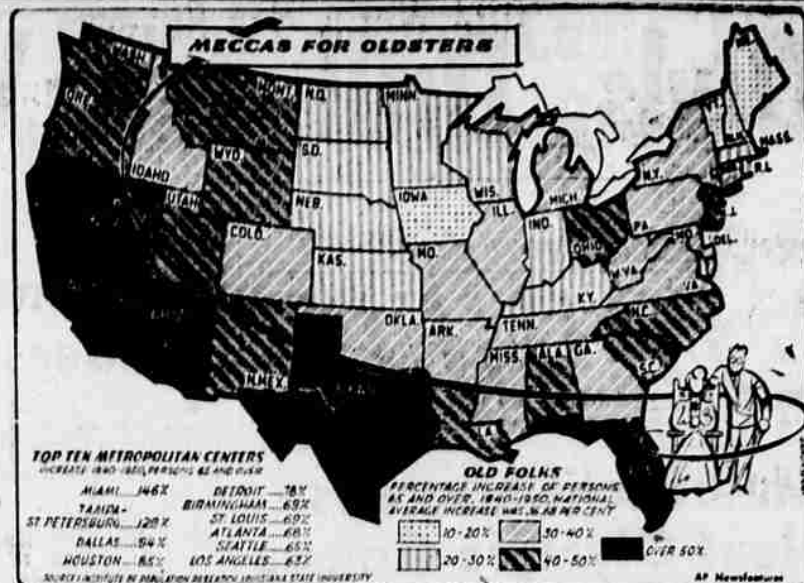
Dr. Homer L. Hill, director of the Institute of Population Research, Louisiana State University, says a number of factors have contributed to the progressive aging of the nation's population.

The first is the long-term decline in the birth rate. Families aren't as big as they used to be. That's true of farm families as well as those who live in city apartments.

Dr. Hill says a second factor is the march of science which has steadily raised living and health standards enabling more people to live longer. The declining birth rate and the declining death rate result in a larger proportion of older than ever before in the total population.

A third factor is the virtual halting of large-scale immigration since the first World War. The great bulk of our foreign-born are now getting old and their place has not been taken by huge numbers of younger immigrants.

Where U.S. Oldsters Make Their Home

The United States almost doubled in population between 1900 and 1960. With that growth have come profound changes.

In 1900 about three million people, one in 25, were 65 years and over. By 1960 those over 65 totaled almost 12.5 million—one in 12 persons.

There have been other equally great changes in the character of the population. In 1900 for the first time women outnumbered men. The latest census shows the country has 1.5 million more women than men.

The age factor exerted a big influence in this change. Because of their greater longevity, women of 65 and over exceed men of the same ages by almost a million.

In 1900 there were only 98 women over 65 for every 100 men in the same age group. By 1960 there were 116 women over 65 for every 100 men.

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and over increased by 3.3 million between 1940 and 1960.

In general the greatest gains were made by the Gulf coast states, led by Florida, followed by the Pacific coast states, including nearby Arizona and Nevada. The south Atlantic states also registered substantial increases.

Oldsters in the nation as a whole increased 36.68 per cent in the decade. The 48 states, primarily because of migration differentials, varied widely.

Phenomenal gains of 85.1 and 81 per cent were made by Arizona and Florida, respectively.

Big increases also were registered in Nevada with 61.6 per cent, California 56.1, Texas 50.5, Louisiana 48.6, Washington 45.5, New Jersey 46 and Alabama 45.8 per cent.

Certain metropolitan centers have become noted as meccas for the aged. The No. One spot for old folks, as might be expected, is the greater Miami, Fla., area. Persons 65 and over increased 146 per cent there in the last decade.

The only other one even approaching Miami is the Tampa-St. Petersburg area in which the elderly increased by 129 per cent.

Other metropolitan areas registering large increases included Dallas with 94 per cent, Houston 85, Detroit 78, Birmingham 69, St. Louis 60, Atlanta 68 and Seattle 65 per cent.

The percentage gain among old

people was 63 in the Los Angeles area and 56 in San Diego, both relatively low compared with the increases in the metropolitan areas of Miami and Tampa-St. Petersburg.

Areas in which the aged made the smallest gains include New England, the midwest and the Great Plains states.

The smallest gain of all was recorded in Vermont—14.6 per cent. The cold Green Mountain state was closely followed by neighboring Maine with 16.5 and New Hampshire with 18.8 per cent.
