

Message May Reveal New Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP) — President Eisenhower's message to Congress today may reveal a new foreign policy, especially co-ordination of U. S. efforts in various areas. There are few reports on what, if anything, the President planned to say on domestic matters.

Lawmakers said they expect him to delay until after additional conferences with Budget Director Joseph M. Dodge any specific recommendations for cutting former President Truman's \$78,000,000,000 budget.

The President was said to have asked for continuance of the governmental reorganization power which expires soon.

Eisenhower was understood to have been urged by Sen. Taft (R-Ohio), the majority leader, to end price-wage controls, as he could do by executive order.

Taft brought up proposed amendments to the Taft-Hartley Law, which he introduced in the Senate yesterday, and apparently got approval for this action.

Takes were reported to have been discussed at length at the conference but some of those who attended said they came away with no clear indication of what Eisenhower's recommendation will be on this score.

The President apparently did not read his message to the legislators, but merely told them in general terms what he planned to say.

One member of Congress said Eisenhower probably will report on his Korean inspection trip without making any immediate recommendations or disclosing what future course towards ending the war he intends to take.

Eisenhower appointed a cold war psychological strategy board yesterday. This was in line with the contention of Secretary of State Dulles that not enough attention has been paid to attempts to undermine the Russians at home and in their satellite countries.

Eisenhower gave a hint of what is in his mind in his inaugural address and Sen. Sparkman (D-Ala.) told a reporter if he follows the lines laid down in that address he will have strong Democratic support.

Sparkman, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said the philosophy behind President Truman's decision to send American troops into Korea was expressed exactly by this often-quoted line from Eisenhower's speech:

"For in the final choice a soldier's pack is not so heavy as a prisoner's chains."

The senator said there were indications in the inaugural address of strong backing for the U. N. extension of the Reciprocal Trade Act and of the Point Four program and continuation of assistance to the free world.

All these, Sparkman predicted, will win strong Democratic backing in the foreign relations committee and Senate as a whole.

Beauty Aids Deductible?

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Two tax consultants Tuesday proposed that working girls be permitted to deduct their beauty costs from their income for tax purposes, just like professional glamour girls do.

It's just as important for secretaries, clerks and other women working for wages to look pretty on the job as it is for the girls of movies, stage, radio and television, argued the consultants.

The tax experts are Glenn Graves and Hugh McMahon, who know a lot about income tax work. They were employed for years in the local office of the Internal Revenue Bureau.

In letters to Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) and two congressmen, they also proposed:

1. That commuters be permitted to deduct from their gross income their fares for traveling to and from work because nowadays it isn't always possible to find housing close to one's job.
2. That persons with adjusted gross income of \$30,000 or less be permitted to deduct the wages, salaries and value of meals and lodging paid domestic help and baby sitters, as well as expenses for care, outside education, of minor children. Because in many cases both the husband and wife have to work to maintain the family adequately.

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China May Aid Vietminh Reds

SAIGON, Indochina (AP) — Official French sources claimed Tuesday that Red China has promised to send troops to support Indochina's Communist-led Vietminh rebels if French union forces appear near victory in the long civil war.

The sources said details of an agreement signed by Moscow-trained Ho Chi Minh, leader of the Vietminh, with Red China and Russia were disclosed by Pham Le Bong, identified as a former high officer with Ho's rebels. Pham recently came over to the side of Bao Dai, chief of state of French-supported Vietnam.

The French said Pham told them that the pact provided:

Red China would furnish the Vietminh with technical instruction, equipment, transport, arms-

ments and industrial equipment to start their own war industries. The French have said previously that the rebels have been receiving such aid from the Chinese Reds for some months.

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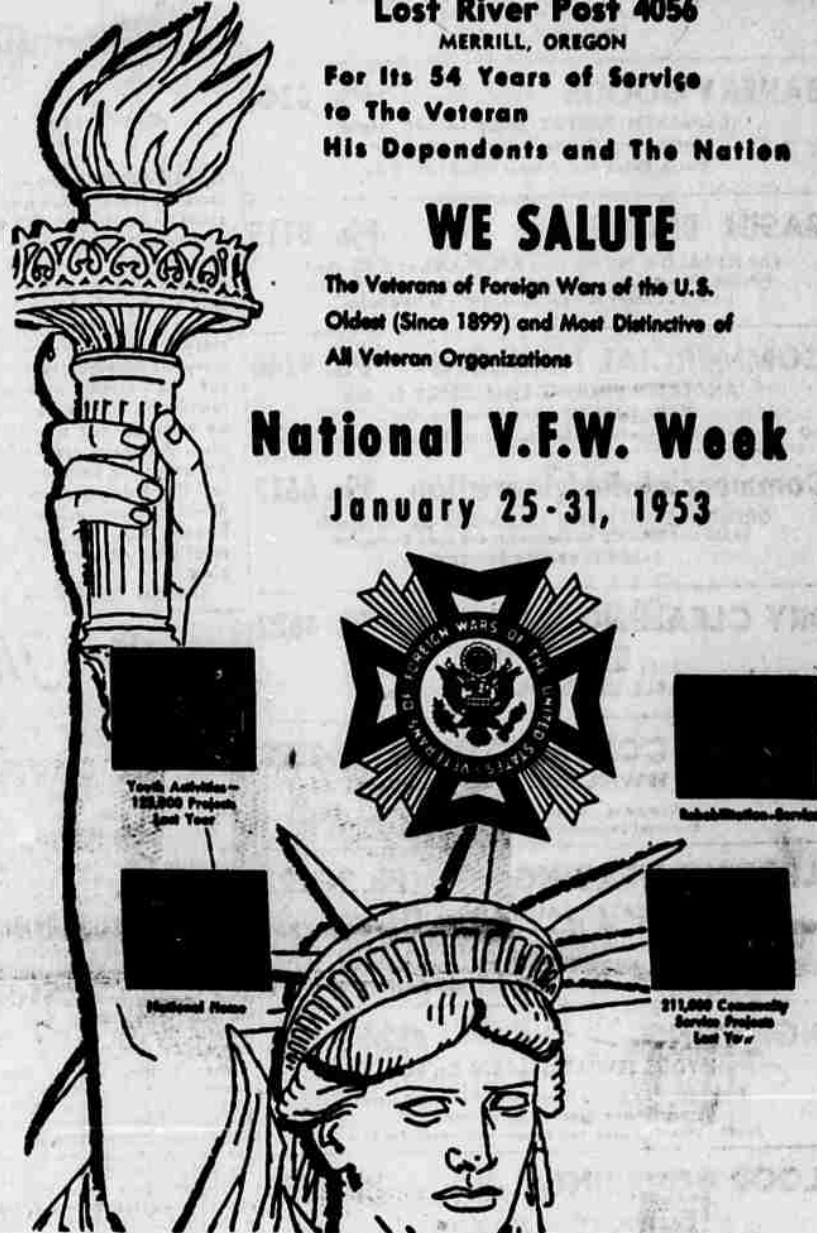
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
