A 22-year-old Klamath Falls man was No. 1 in his class in a 25th Division Noncommissioned Officers School in Korea and Roy D. Driskill is now a master sergeant as a result of his high ranking. Driskill was first of the first four rankings from his regiment, the 16th Infantry. He is in a tank company, and is a tank commander. He graduated from Post Falls, Ida., high school, and attended the University of Idaho at Moscow. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Driskill, 2329 Bristol Ave. His wife Patricia, and a two-week-old son are living with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Reynolds, at Post Falls, Ida. A brother, John, is an airman second class serving as a radio operator with the Navy in Japan. Driskill's score, out of 1,000 possible, was 870 points, according to a report in the regiment's publication, the Golden Dragon. The next three scores were 837, 833 and 832. Driskill's score set a new record for the NCO school. Regimental Commander Col. H. G. Leonard Jr. gave all four top-rankers an extra five days of rest and rehabilitation leave in Japan, as well as each a promotion.

Earl Hughes Death Told

PORT KLAMATH - Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Olli returned Jan. 28, to their home at Crater Lake National Park after spending a few days at Lakeside, Ore., where they were called last week by news of the accidental death of her son, Earl "Shortie" Hughes, who was drowned near Lakeside about 8 p.m. Jan. 21.

In company with a friend, Leonard Maki, also of Lakeside, Hughes was returning to the Maki home seven miles above the North Lake resort when the boat in which they were making the return trip from Lakeside, shipped water and overturned. Maki was rescued by a friend in another boat, but Hughes had disappeared from sight under the flooding waters.

Grappling hooks from the Coos Bay fire department and the Charleston Coast Guard Station were taken to the scene Thursday, and a crew of Coast Guardsmen from Umpqua River assisted the volunteers on Thursday and Friday in dragging operations. The body of the drowned man was not recovered until shortly after noon on Friday, Jan. 25, when it was found by Harold Benson and Leonard Carlson, Lakeside volunteer searchers.

Thirty-three years old at the time of his death, Hughes was born at Lakeside July 13, 1919, later attending Klamath Union High School. He was well known throughout Klamath County, and had been employed as truck driver for the Benson Creek Lumber Company.

In addition to his stepfather and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Olli of Crater Lake National Park, Hughes is survived by his father, Thomas W. Hughes, Beaverton, Ore.

Following services held at 11 a.m. on Monday at Mills Memorial Chapel in Coos Bay, the remains were forwarded to Klamath Falls, where final rites were conducted at O'Hair's Memorial Chapel Tuesday, Jan. 27, at 2 p.m., with graveside services and interment in Linkville cemetery.

For the past several years, Mr. and Mrs. Olli have been residents of Crater Lake Park, where he is employed as plumber in the National Park service. Their many friends in Port Klamath extend sympathy in their loss, made doubly tragic by the fact that this is the second of Mrs. Olli's sons to meet accidental death, her only other son having been killed at the age of 18 in a logging truck mishap. She has no remaining children.
