British Mull Slave Charges

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Britain is looking into charges that her African protectorates are shipping at least 5,000 Negroes each month for sale in the slave markets of Saudi Arabia and Yemen.

The British don't think the charges are true, but their government has begun an investigation anyway. The inquiry is complicated by the fact that slave markets are legal in Saudi Arabia, Yemen and other countries so far has revealed its sources of supply.

Both countries, the U. N.'s anti-slavery section said today, have ignored questionnaires sent them on slavery and forced labor.

Britain's U. N. delegation also revealed, in answer to a query from the U. N., that slavery still is legal in the oil-rich sheikdom of Kuwait, on the Northwest Coast of the Persian Gulf, but that actual buying and selling of slaves is now prohibited there. Kuwait is under Britain's protection and the British handle foreign relations for the sheik.

Saudi Arabia, Yemen and Kuwait all are Moslem countries and Moslem law permits slavery and slave trading.

The charges of large-scale slave traffic between Britain's African possessions and the Arabian kingdoms originated with Jacques Alain, who described himself in a communication to the U. N. Commission on Human Rights as a French explorer living in North Africa.

Both British authorities and U. N. officials said they knew nothing about Alain.

Alain said the slave trade worked like this:

"Armed, whip-wielding raiders swoop down on native villages isolated around the fringes of the Sahara and in the Central African jungles. Those captured are chained together and marched by secret trails to hidden 'slave coops' on the Red Sea, where they are loaded on rickety ships and taken to Saudi Arabia for distribution.

During the march 10 to 20 per cent of the enslaved die of exhaustion, thirst or starvation," Alain said.

Council Raps Lie's Policy

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Representatives of the 3,000-man U. N. staff called on Secretary General Trygve Lie today to their American fellow workers a "reasonable" time to answer complicated questions in the million-dollar inquiry probe instituted by Washington.

The U. N.'s 40-member staff council also made clear it felt the council should have been consulted before Lie agreed to fingerprint American employees of the U. N. as part of the U. S. security checks. Their stand was taken in a unanimous counted vote yesterday as Americans continued working on the questionnaires.

The secretary general, obviously disturbed by the staff council action, issued this statement:

"I have acted in what I believe to be the best interest of the U. N. staff. If they had any questions, I regret they did not first ask them before passing hasty resolutions which indicate a misunderstanding of the situation."

Vidor Charges Wife Neglect

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Film director King Vidor says the only matrimonial chore his wife wanted to perform for him was to tell the cook when he'd be home for dinner.

The statement was in Vidor's cross-complaint, filed yesterday, for a divorce or annulment. Pending is Mrs. Vidor's divorce suit charging the director with infidelity.

In 1951, he set forth, his wife insisted that they occupy separate rooms. About that time, his complaint added, she said she would do nothing for him besides notifying the cook of his dinner hour.

Mental Patients Miss Breakfast

SINGAPORE (AP)—Inmates of Woodbridge Mental Hospital shook cell doors and pounded walls today because they got no breakfast. The hospital's 480 attendants went on strike for higher wages. Authorities rushed six cooks from Singapore prison to feed the 1,758 hospital patients. Guards from the prisons took charge of 100 criminally insane.

Hollywood Tackles Tongue Twisting Film Production

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Ash, such a business this! Now they're making movies in English and German at the same time.

The bilingual epic is "The Moon Is Blue," from the highly successful stage play. Armed with a German-English dictionary, I dropped by the set to see how the unique project was carried out.

I arrived on the first day of shooting to find they were filming a scene in an international language. Starlet Dawn Adams was taking a bath. She is the only player who appears in both versions, since most of her dialog is on the telephone. Thus it can easily be dubbed into German.

She writhed luxuriously in the lukewarm, scented water. Very interesting.

What a head producer-director Otto Preminger direct a scene in English, faintly accented by his native Vienna. It was a scene wherein David Niven offers Maggie McNamara (who starred in the play in Chicago) the gift of \$600.

"Cut! Print!" announced Preminger when the scene was to his satisfaction. "Now the German version."

Miss McNamara moved out of the set. Her place was taken by Johanna Matz, a buxom young Viennese and star of German pictures. Niven was replaced by Johannes Heesters, a Dutchman who is one of the top romantic actors in Germany.

Now Preminger switched to German and gave the players instructions. Not much was needed, since they had been watching the American version of the scene.

"Lost!" commanded the director, uttering the German equivalent of "Action!" The players went through the same scene as before, but only Preminger and his assistant could understand them. When the scene was satisfactory, a still picture was taken.

Then Miss McNamara and Niven replaced the Germans, posed for a still and resumed rehearsing the next scene. Just like clockwork.

"How are you getting along?" I asked Preminger.

"Fine. But I have only shot three days so far. Anything can happen."

He is a much harassed man. For 10 days prior to shooting he alternately rehearsed the American cast for eight hours, then the Germans for eight hours. I asked him why he undertook the project.

"For one thing, the German market is very big for films," he replied. "I figure that by doing the picture in German with top German stars, I can add 50 per cent to the gross. And the publicity value of doing a bilingual version is worth the expense."

 He calculated that the double shooting would add a bout 10 per cent additional expense. The prospect of extra revenue from the German version allows him to spend more money on sets, etc., he remarked. His partner in the venture is P. Hugh Herbert, who wrote the play.

Preminger slips from one language to the other with the ease of a new car shifting gears. I asked him whether he thought in German or English.

"After a few weeks of this—who thinks?" he replied.
