First Aid Classes Set

FORT KLAMATH - At long last, Fort Klamath is to have an advanced course in American Red Cross first aid, something that has been hoped for by those interested for quite some time past.

The classes will be held at the C. I. Clubhouse, and will be at 7 o'clock on the evenings of Feb. 3, 4, 5, 10 and 12, the complete course being of 12 hours duration with four three-hour sessions on the dates named. Coming here to instruct the group will be Jim Darton, Civil Air Aeronautics, Klamath Falls. Anyone interested in advanced first aid is invited to be on hand at the clubhouse at 7 p.m., for the first evening of instruction by Darton. Already several have signed up for the course, and all are welcome to attend.

Two courses in standard first aid technique have been conducted here in the past, the first having been given during World War II by Mrs. Kenneth Roberts, then a resident of the neighboring town of Chiloquin and now living in Klamath Falls. More recently, a second course of standard first aid was given here by Rangers Wayne Howe and Duane Fitzgerald, electrician Paul Koehler and warehouseman (now ranger) Paul Turner, of the Crater Lake National Park Service, all of whom have since left the park with the exception of ranger Turner.

In view of the fact that, while we do have registered nurses in Fort Klamath the community does not have a doctor's medical service, the first aid knowledge is especially valuable here, and during past years has proved its worth many times.

Scouts Provide New Ski Tow

ELY - A 700-foot ski tow which will be known as the Boy Scout tow but will be open to the use of the public free of charge, has been awaiting a snow fall to be put to enthusiastic use by Boy Scouts.

Boy Scouts and their Scoutmaster, Spike Armstrong, have worked on this project for about two years. The tow rope was purchased by the Scouts with money earned selling Christmas trees from the Lakewick Ski Club. Pieces of motor were donated by the townspeople and repaired by Herb Hadley, Spangler Lumber Company donated some lumber and Ely gas stations donated the gas to operate the motor. Clarence Dallas, owner of Drews Valley Ranch, donated a cabin located at the bottom of the run which will be used as a warming hut.

The tow is located on the Quartz Mountain Highway and the Scouts plan to operate it on afternoons of the weekends from 1 to 4 when the weather is suitable.
