WASHINGTON (U.P.)—In office only a few days, President Eisenhower already has had a bumpy time of it with Congress, where his own party is in control.

He has not had a break with the lawmakers. He has not suffered any major defeats or received any major victories. But he has refused to rubber-stamp suggestions.

Most of his trouble has been with men he picked for high posts. But the groundwork was laid a week to make it easier for Eisenhower to block suggestions.

His first attempt at reorganizing the warplane the government would, are said to have told Eisenhower "Nothing doing".

The highest hurdle for the heart patient to surmount is fear. In most cases this fear is not justified. In fact, since a high proportion of patients with heart disease should be actively employed outside the home, it has been shown beyond question that the fear of work is unfounded.

Furthermore, a study of the work done by a group of persons who had heart disease in comparison with a group of persons who did not showed very little difference in work done. In fact, such differences as there were favored the group

that when work is suitably adjusted to the ability of the heart, useful occupation is all to the good. The one tell what work is suitable for a heart is the heart itself. Is it strong? Is it weak? Is it healthy? Is it ill? There are simple measures available today for the doctor to test the patient and find out quite exactly the amount of work that can safely be done. The doctor's reservations are not based on the heart, but on the mind. The heart is not the seat of the mind. The mind is the seat of the heart trouble! This does not mean, of course, that all victims of heart disease are feeble, but it does mean that the mere presence of heart trouble by no means implies the end of any useful occupation for a great many people. The heart is the seat of those of those involved. Suitable work is available for them, and is useful, economically and psychologically, not only for those whose hearts are weak, but also for the strong hearted. It is a very simple matter to adjust the work to the heart.
