REYNOLDS' TOPS IN SPORT IS FOOTBALL

NEW YORK (AP)—Allie Reynolds, the Yankees' great right-hander, was cooling out after a little discussion of salary with his employers. And the conversation turned to a number of oil wells in which the Chief has an active interest in his native Oklahoma.

"Look, Allie," a fellow said. "If you should suddenly make a million dollars out of those wells would you tell the Yankees goodbye or would you go right on pitching baseball? I mean, do you love the game so much that you couldn't give it up?"

"That's not too hard to answer," said the World Series hero. "The truth is that I never have liked baseball. It's just the best way I know of to make money. I always liked football a whole lot better. Maybe it was because of the body contact."

SILENCE

There was a minute or two of stunned silence while the boys discussed this bit of information.

"Maybe it's because I've been a pitcher that I missed football," he ventured. "I loved to tackle as much as I did to carry the ball and I didn't like to sit on the bench. Saigh's Future in Hand's of Frick, Giles

NEW YORK (AP)—Fred Saigh's baseball future today was in the hands of two of the sport's top officials — Commissioner Ford Frick and National League President Warren Giles.

The owner of the St. Louis Cardinals, sentenced to 18 months in prison and fined \$75,000 for income tax evasion, confers today with Frick and Giles regarding the sale of his Cardinal holdings.

A few hours before the crucial conference, Saigh said:

"I don't want to sell but I will not do anything that will embarrass baseball."

Even before Saigh arrived in New York, several undisclosed offers were made for his stock, which amounts to practically 100 per cent.

Bill Walsingham Jr., vice president of the Cardinals, said:

"I definitely would be interested in purchasing the club if and when Mr. Saigh decided to dispose of his holdings."

Walsingham is a nephew of the late Sam Walsingham from whom Saigh and the late Bob Hannegan bought the Cardinals.

Saigh, somewhat recovered from the jolt that may scotch him out of baseball, calmly discussed his sentence.

"It was as if I were standing on a street corner and was hit by a truck," he began. "I don't mind saying that I am morally sick over what has happened. But I repeat as I have said all along—there never was any intent of fraud on my part. If the government would select any competent attorneys to investigate my books, I defy them to find any fraud or any semblance of fraud there. Differences of opinion, yes, but no fraud."

NORTHERN DIVISION SPOTLIGHT SHOTS

With the league-leading Washington Huskies temporarily out of the picture, Northern Division basketball interest shifts Friday and Saturday nights to the corridor for the second-place berth currently occupied by the Oregon Ducks.

Oregon State and Idaho will be gunning for the Ducks while Washington, the nation's No. 2 team in the Associated Press poll, occupies a three-game, non-conference series in Seaside.

The Huskies, who have made a runaway of the Northern Division race with eight straight wins and Universal Motors Friday night and the University of Hawaii Saturday night, they opened the series with a narrow 64-63 win over Universal Motors Wednesday night.

Oregon State, in fourth place but only a game back of Oregon, plays the Ducks at Eugene Friday night and at Corvallis Saturday night. Idaho, in third place half a game behind Oregon, faces Washington State at Moscow Friday night with the best prospects of improving its position.

While basketball is the main event in the Oregon-Ducks series, there will be a WBCU basketball game between the Ducks and the Huskies at Seaside.

A split basketball conference program starts today at 7:30 p.m. at the University of Oregon. The Ducks will play the Huskies and the Huskies will play the Ducks in the same location.

A double victory by Oregon, however, would put the Ducks one full game ahead of the Huskies and the Huskies' lead to three games.

All games are expected to be at top strength.

Graham Defeats Aragon

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Irish Billy Graham, at 30, figures he's still far from being counted out of the welterweight boxing ring picture.

The ranking New Yorker Thursday night put a damper on the hopes of the California "Golden Boy," Art Aragon, with a unanimous 10-round decision at the Olympic Auditorium. Billy's fighting was too much for the Los Angeles "battler" who looked good in flurries, but couldn't match the Irishman's boxing skill.

Harrison Leads At Tucson

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)—Dutch Harrison, the old Arkansas Traveler now playing out of Ardmore, Okla., holds a scant one-stroke lead over a tightly packed field at the start of Friday's second round of the \$10,000 Tucson Open golf tournament.

Harrison and a half dozen other tourney-wise veterans shoved most of the up-and-coming youngsters into the background during the initial circuit of the par 70, 6,402-yard El Rio Golf and Country Club layout as they finished in the first 10.

Harrison equalled his lowest competitive score during about 20 years of pro golf Thursday when he carded a 34-30-64, six under par.

Challenging him with scores of 65 are Jim Turnesa, Briarcliff, N. Y., the present PGA champ, John Palmer, Charlotte, N. C., winner of the 1952 Canadian Open, the fiery Tommy Bolt, Maplewood, N. Y., victor in the recent San Diego Open, and Iverson Martin, a Texan playing out of Maplewood, N. J., who has never won a pro event.

Lloyd Mangrum, Niles, Ill., the pre-tourney favorite trails by eight strokes with 72.
