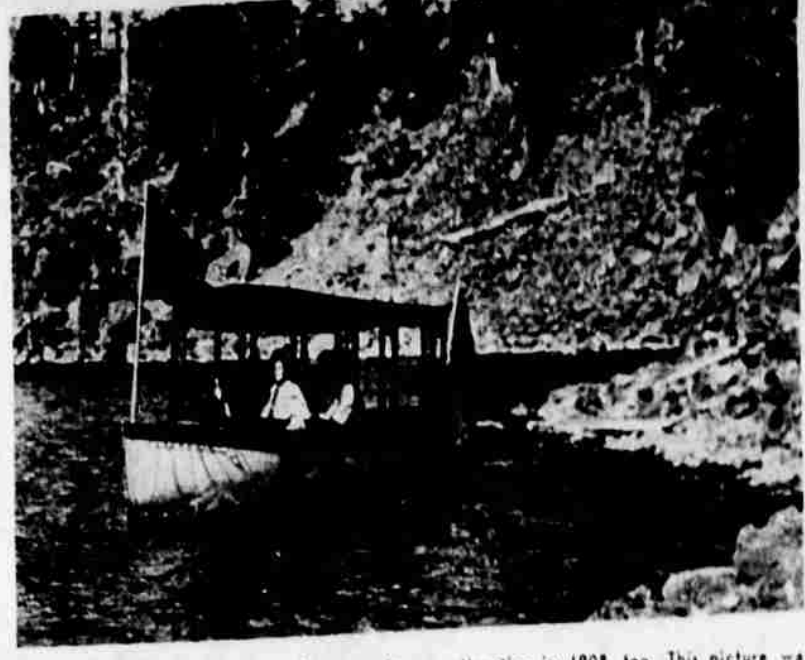

Chamber Eyes Photo Frauds

A recent report from the National Better Business Bureau, and published in Klamath Keynotes of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce, warns against a minority of photo studios which use devious methods of doing business.

The bureau works with the chamber in attempts to protect the public from frauds and misrepresentation.

Generally photo studios depend on their skill and fair dealing to hold a permanent place in the community, but sometimes opportunists are found who resort to unfair practices.

For instance, there's the "frame up" which the bureau tabs the most deceptive of the practices. Customers get customers to sign up for photos at reasonable rates, but at the same time—in fine print—commit them to also buy expensive frames at a fancy price.

Another method involves reproduction of snapshots of sentimental value, which once in the hand of the "photographer" become "lost" unless the customers order more copies, an expensive frame and other items.

Sometimes the photos are lost permanently, the customer still holding a phony receipt for downpayment.

Sometimes honest and legitimate studios put out coupon offers and other advertising gimmicks in house efforts to solicit business. Unethical shops, meanwhile, use high pressure methods to force a big sale. Naturally the bureau points out the honest studio expects to pick up more business from the coupon offer, but depend on skill and honest show of quality to do more business.

Such unfair practices as these, and in other fields of business, should be reported at once to the Chamber of Commerce, through which the public will be able to protect itself.



Dairy Farmers Meet Monday

Dairy farmers, creamers operators and milk consumers are scheduled to gather in the city council chambers at the city hall Monday at 10 a.m. to provide testimony in a public hearing for the Oregon Milk Marketing Administration.

The meeting was called by the State Board of Agriculture after both producers and distributors of dairy products objected to price orders cutting back prices on milk, or forcing an increase in butterfat content in place of the price reduction.

Several other Oregon communities are due for similar hearings for similar reasons during February.

No consumers have participated in hearings in recent years. Dairy men have prepared cost formulas showing the costs of producing milk, and distributors in past such hearings have presented their cost sheets as well.

Under the new price orders distributors have indicated they cannot make ends meet. They sacrificed the butterfat increase as dairymen would receive no cut in their milk sales receipts.

Tragedy Turns Military Ship

NEW YORK (AP)—Bewildered and grief-stricken, an Army sergeant was returned here last night aboard a Europe-bound military ship which turned around 40 miles at sea so he could go back to his tragedy-torn family in Arkansas.

Sgt. Finnis F. Pummill of Newport, Ark., was headed overseas on the Military Sea Transport Service vessel Eltinge, Word was radioed that his 2-month-old daughter, Barbara Jean, was dead, and his wife, Ora, 26, seriously ill.

The Eltinge reversed its course and faced back to Amrose Lightship, where a tugboat waited to bring Pummill ashore.

The Red Cross arranged for a loan so the sergeant could fly home.

He was scheduled to leave LaGuardia Field today.

The Pummills have another child, Mary, 2. The nature of the wife's illness was not disclosed. Pummill has been in service six years.

Personal Debts Total Up

WASHINGTON (AP)—The personal debts of Americans added up to \$23,975,000,000 at the end of last year, the Federal Reserve Board says.

It reported yesterday that consumer credit jumped 3 1/3 billion dollars during 1952. That was more than six times the 1951 increase.

Consumer installment credit increased \$2,996,000,000 during 1952 to reach a total of 16 1/2 billion dollars.

Russ A - Bomb Supply Seen

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former President Truman's expression of doubt Monday that the Russians have a workable A-bomb got another official disclaimer yesterday, this time from the chief of the Atomic Energy Commission.

Said Gordon Dean: "There is no doubt of the existence of a supply of atomic weapons in the USSR."

Earlier three leading members of the Senate-House Atomic Committee had issued a joint statement calling the Truman remark "highly unfortunate."

New Aluminum Plant Charted

WASHINGTON (AP)—The nation's newest aluminum plant will be a 70 million dollar installation using Tennessee Valley Authority power to produce 50,000 tons of metal annually.

The Defense Production Administration announced yesterday the Wheeland Company of Chattanooga, Tenn., would construct the plant, receiving federal tax benefits. Exact location was not settled.

DPA said this plant, the seventh basic aluminum producer in the country, would complete the third round of aluminum expansion for defense, bringing domestic output by Jan. 1, 1955, to 1,750,000 tons.

Live Scorpions By Mail?

WASHINGTON (AP)—Scorpions engaged in a good cause would be given the freedom of the U. S. mails, under a bill pending in the Senate.

Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz.) introduced the measure yesterday. It would allow live scorpions intended for use for medical purposes to be mailed.

They would have to be packed in containers providing adequate protection to mail handlers.

Reds Refused Another Trial

NEW YORK (AP)—A federal judge has denied all motions for a new trial asked by the 13 Communist leaders convicted on charges of conspiring to advocate the overthrow of the government by force.

Said Judge Edward J. Dimock yesterday: "I deny all motions. The discussions of these motions before me were very informative and threw a light on the weight of evidence against the defendants which I never had before."

Defense lawyers for the 13 have been arguing new trial motions since Wednesday.

Judge Dimock has set sentencing for Monday.

Fate Keeps Date With Soldier

NEW YORK (AP)—Robert J. Horne, 26, of Staten Island, joined the Army on Jan. 19, 1951.

On Jan. 19, 1952, he sailed for Korea.

On Jan. 19, 1953, he was killed in action, the Defense Department notified his mother yesterday.
