

Chiloquin Methodist Church Is Scene of Buck - Gienger Nuptials

CHILOQUIN—In a beautiful gold, green and white winter setting, Nina Buck, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. J. L. Buck of Tualatin, became the bride of Leroy A. Gienger, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy A. J. Gienger, Chiloquin. The double ring ceremony was read by the bride's father at one p.m. last Sunday, Jan. 25, at the Methodist Church.

Sprays of white juniper were used throughout the church and on the altar level were tall white tapers in candelabra and baskets of white flowers, attractive arrangements of calla lilies, snapdragons and chrysanthemums. Bows were marked with sprays of white snapdragons tied with wide satin streamers.

The bride, escorted down the aisle by her brother-in-law, Forrest Freid, and given in marriage by her mother, wore a beautiful marquisette and lace gown over white tulle. It was fashioned with a hooped skirt inset with wide lace bands, a lace trimmed yoke and full sleeves gathered into tight wrist bands. The dress was worn by her sister, Mrs. Freid, at her wedding.

The nylon net fingertip veil was gathered into a tiny close fitting cap outlined in seed pearls. The

For her daughter's wedding, Mrs. Buck chose a navy blue and white suit with matching accessories and she wore a red rose corsage.

The mother of the bridegroom wore a gray faille suit trimmed in black velvet with black accessories. Her corsage was of red rosebuds.

A reception was held in the church basement immediately following the ceremony, and was given by Mrs. Forrest Freid.

The all white table was centered with a high three tiered confection topped with a cluster of wedding bells. Silver candelabra held all tapers on either side of the cake, which was cut and served by the bridegroom's sister, Mrs. Glen Kircher.

The bride attended Chiloquin schools but is a graduate of Tigard high school. The bridegroom was graduated from Chiloquin High School and attended Oregon State College before joining his father in ranching.

For her going-away suit Mrs. Gienger chose a tan outfit with brown and white accessories. The young couple will have an apartment in the Gienger building upon their return this weekend from a wedding trip south.
