Old Education Authority to Appear Here Tomorrow

The D. H. H. Education Authority, featured at the Parents-Patrons meeting, Feb. 4, 8 p.m., will discuss the importance of the education of the child, the role of the parent, and the role of the community. The speaker will be a representative of the authority, who will be a native of the state, but is not a resident of Klamath Falls. He and his wife have four children. He therefore, approaches the subject with the personal interest of all thinking parents: with the added qualifications of experience: graduate work at the University of Oregon in the field of special education; and as graduate assistant in charge of the Psycho-Educational Clinic, 1948-50.

A veteran of World War II, he saw active service in Korea, returning with the rank of captain. Since his return a little over a year ago, he was chosen by the State Board of Education to work on the survey and program for gifted and mentally handicapped children under House Joint Resolution 6. The problem exists, and in his talk Wednesday, he will not deal in theories; but will discuss practical measures essential to a sound solution.

TULELAKE—The N. C. Jannsen Drilling and Machinery Company, Seattle, has been awarded the contract for deepening the city's deep-water well by the City Council. Drilling is expected to get underway this month.

Payment will be on a per-hour basis. The council is prepared to drop the bore another 700 feet to 3,000 feet if necessary to reach palatable, soft water for city use. A figure of \$15,000 has been set as the maximum for the operation. Drilling will be at emergency speed since the city distribution is depending on a shallower well. The deep well has not been in use for several weeks while a pump has been under repair.
