Oklahoma A&M Wins Fourth

The Oklahoma Aggies don't own the Missouri Valley Basketball Conference. It just seems that way.

Hank Iba's lads have won or shared 12 Mo. Valley titles since 1936, and it looks as though Lucky 13 is coming up.

The precision-minded Aggies, ninth-ranked nationally, ran the league record to 4-0 Monday night by whipping Detroit, 67-58, at Stillwater.

That gave them a one-game lead over Tulsa and St. Louis, tied for second place with 3-2 records.

It was a good night for members of the top ten. In addition to A&M, three of the select group played and all racked up impressive victories.

SLAUGHTER
Second-ranked Indiana, paced by Don Schlund's 33 points, returned from a two-week vacation and slaughtered Butler, 103-70.

Sixth-ranked Illinois also hung up a lopsided win, blasting DePaul, 92-50, and eighth-ranked Western Kentucky survived a slow-style attack to defeat Bowling Green, 64-60.

However, Oklahoma, the B-1 S. leader, didn't have it so good.

After three straight league wins, Oklahoma fell before Iowa State, 73-69. This was the upset of the night but the Sooners still clung to the Big Seven lead, with a 3-1 record.

PITT WINS
Several good inter-sectional games were played. In them, Pittsburgh rallied in the last 15 seconds to defeat Houston, 66-63; Bradley topped Arizona, 65-62; Dayton trimmed Loyola of New Orleans, 78-65, as Jim Paxton scored 19 points.

And, last but certainly not least, Bevo Francia scored 61 points to lead unbeaten Rio Grande to a 97-62 victory over Pikeville, Ky. Bevo now has 1,402 points in 28 games.
