June Haver Turns Back On Hollywood Salary, Will Become Sister Of Charity

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Actress June Haver turned her back on movieland's tinseled brilliance today to become a nun.

The 26-year-old blond dancing star, whose salary rose to \$3,500 a week but whose career also brought her personal tragedy, ended months of rumors about her intentions by issuing a poignant statement last night.

Without disclosing her whereabouts, nor where and when she will enter a convent, Miss Haver telephoned the statement to her studio and asked that it be distributed publicly. It said:

"To all my friends:

"Now that I am about to do something that some of you perhaps will find it difficult to understand, I have thought it well to make a public statement.

"I am going away to prepare myself, by several years of prayer and study, for something I have been contemplating for the past two years. I am determined to be a Sister of Charity, with the grace of God and the approval of His church, and to consecrate my life to the service of God in His sick and in His children.

"To do this will take more ability than I have. That is why I am going to prepare myself in a novitiate of work and prayer. It at

the end of my two years of preparation, my religious superiors judge that I am able to do this. I shall consecrate myself by vow to this kind of life.

"As far as I am concerned, I know what I want to do. But what I want must also be what God wants. May His will be done.

"You, my friends who have helped me as well in the past, I know will continue to help me with prayer, that I may always be generous in the service of God."

Miss Haver sold her home in the Cheviot Hills section a year ago and recently auctioned her possessions, closed her apartment and moved in with her mother, Mrs. Marie Ottstad. She has terminated her nine-year association with 20th Century-Fox Studio, her most recent contract running to Feb. 20.

She finished her last picture, "The Girl Next Door," a musical comedy, with Dan Ditley, last November and has done no movie work since. The picture is yet to be released.

Born June Stovener in Rock Island, Ill., Miss Haver came to Beverly Hills, Calif., as a youngster. She sang with Ted Fio Rito's band, then went into the movies in 1934 at 17. Her pictures included "Home in Indiana," "Three Little Girls in Blue," "Irish Eyes Are Smiling," "The Daughter of Rosie O'Grady" and "The Dolly Sisters."

But as her movie star ascended, tragedy clouded her life. In 1947 she eloped with Jimmy Zito, swing band trumpeter. Later they were married in the Catholic church. But the marriage ended in divorce a few months later.

She resumed an old friendship with a dentist, Dr. John Duzik, and they reportedly planned to marry, but he died after a short illness in October, 1949.

Miss Haver visited the Vatican in Rome during the holy year pilgrimage in 1951 and became active in the Newman Club of Catholic students at the University of California at Los Angeles.

During the filming of her last picture, she fell, injuring her back, while doing a dance on a whirling table. The injury, and internal complications, kept her from work for months.

Hairdo's Cost Scholars Time

TOKYO (AP)—The Tokyo Jogakkan, exclusive girls' high school, today suspended 44 Japanese students for getting permanent waves.

Fifty-nine others were ordered to get letters of apology from their parents for the same offense.

Principal Genichi Sawada said the penalties were proposed by the Student Council.

He said permanent waves were banned "to nurture wholesomeness among the students and to avoid showiness which would make the girls susceptible to advances by delinquents."

Other school regulations:

1. Fix the number of creases, color and style of overcoats.
2. Prescribe the type of socks and shoes.
3. Ban hair clips and compel girls to braid long hair.
4. Ban conspicuous hair decorations, limit the width and length of hair ribbons and the color to that of the girl's hair.

One 17-year-old girl complained the regulations made school life drab.

She was told not to return while her permanent still waved.

Film Awards To Be Given

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Tonight Lucille Ball will have her first night out since the birth of her celebrated baby, and she may take home some awards with her.

The carrot-topped comedienne in a favored contender for three principal awards to be handed out by the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences this evening. She is entered in the races for the best comedienne and most outstanding personality in TV, the show starring her and Desi Arnaz, "I Love Lucy." It is up for the "best situation-comedy program" title.

If Miss Ball wins the Academy's "Emmy" (derived from "image"), it will be a delayed tribute. Last year Red Skelton received the statuette as the best comic of the year. He remarked that it should have been awarded to Lucille and tried to hand it to her. She refused.

Stars and workers will gather at the Statler Hotel for tonight's gala event. Obviously patterned after the Oscars of motion pictures, the Emmies are voted by the 400 members of the TV Academy.

New England Weather Cold

There was a mixture of wintry and spring weather in the nation Thursday.

It was below zero in sections of New England, the country's coldest region, while fair and mild weather continued in the Southwest. Early morning readings included -3 at Montpelier, Vt., and -1 at Lebanon, N. H. The cold air extended into parts of the Southeast. Generally fair weather prevailed over most of the eastern part of the country except for snow flurries in New England.

Winds with gusts up to 45 to 50 miles an hour were reported in Western Nebraska, Kansas and Eastern Colorado. Skies were overcast in the Central States with showers over wide areas. Freezing rain hit along the Canadian border of North Dakota and Minnesota. Rain also was reported west of the Rockies, with heaviest falls along the Oregon and Washington coasts.

It was 89 in Laredo, Tex., Wednesday, the nation's highest reading. It was 74 in Salina, Kan., the same as at Miami, Fla.

Peace Prize For Harry Truman?

ANKARA, Turkey (AP)—Turkish President Celal Bayar has joined Greek Premier Alexander Papagos in proposing former U. S. President Truman for the Nobel Peace Prize.

Bayar cabled his proposal yesterday to the Norwegian Parliament, which elects a five-member committee to make the awards. Papagos made a similar proposal last week.

Bayar said Truman should receive the award for his "invaluable services for the cause of peace and fraternity among nations."

The former President is highly regarded in Greece and Turkey as author of the "Truman Doctrine" of postwar military aid to the two countries and for his efforts to have them included in the North Atlantic Alliance.

Church Council Acts on Bills

PORTLAND (AP)—A legislative program for the Oregon Council of Churches was approved in a series of resolutions at the group's annual meeting here Tuesday.

The Council urged the State Liquor Commission to restore the early evening ban on radio and television advertising of beer—and then went a step further, opposing all forms of liquor advertising at all times.

Other resolutions:

Approve House Bill 24 which would put racing revenues into the general fund.

Urged, if that measure passed, that appropriations for youth activities and fairs be at least as large as those for the present biennium.

Asked appointment of a full-time Protestant chaplain at Oregon State Hospital.

Suggested that marriage license forms require applicants to state previous marital status and age.

After some opposition was expressed, the Council approved steps leading toward the merger of the Portland and Oregon councils.

Fur Coat Scandals Reopen As Probers Look Into Past Of Liquor Board Member

WASHINGTON (AP)—House probers who turned up the first fur coat mystery of the 1935 investigating season dug today for new evidence of unexplained spending by a former top tax official in the Truman administration.

Chairman Keen (R-N.J.) of a House ways and means subcommittee said today's hearing would show "a continued pattern of unexplained spending" by Carroll E. Mealey as head of the Internal Revenue Bureau's alcohol tax unit.

Federal Revenue Agents Martin L. Webb of St. Louis and Charles H. Mamesbury of Philadelphia were called as today's first witnesses and asked to detail Mealey's financial transactions in 1948, 1949 and 1950.

Keen announced that Dwight E. Avis, chief of the alcohol tax division, would be heard later today in closed session on politics in the division. Avis has told the committee that "the wrong kind" of politics had hampered efficient administration of his unit.

Agents Webb and Mamesbury testified yesterday that in 1948 and 1947, Mealey's first two years with the tax unit, he spent—or received—\$11,095 more than he listed on his income tax returns.

One such unexplained item \$2,600 paid in cash to a New York dealer for a fur coat as a gift to Mrs. Mealey. Nutria is a light brown fur something like beaver only more expensive.

The agents said Mealey, of Albany, N. Y., was steered to the dealer by Louis Pokras, a liquor dealer named in earlier testimony as an associate of gambling figure Frank Costello.

That same year, the agents said, Mealey personally intervened to get a federal liquor permit for Pokras, who previously had been denied a permit on various occasions.

The witnesses said Pokras denied paying for the coat himself.

They said he told them he did put down \$1,842 for a new car bought on Mealey's behalf in 1947. But they quoted Pokras as saying Mealey reimbursed him—in cash and with no record of the transaction.

Pokras, the agents said, offered the explanation that he had contacts in the automobile business and was able to get a car for Mealey at a time when new cars were scarce.

Pokras said in New York yesterday: "I absolutely deny that I gave or paid for, either directly or indirectly, an automobile or fur coat to Carroll Mealey or his wife."

He said it was "loose allegation" to link him in any way with Costello. He said he has neither
