SP Initiates Charity Plan

Plans have been completed by the Southern Pacific that will permit employees to take advantage of the payroll deduction plan with one contribution to cover the Community Chest, American Red Cross, Heart Fund and Cancer Fund.

The S.P., with over 300 employees in the Klamath area, has adopted the name of the Klamath Falls Community Services Fund for their payroll deduction plan. One contribution will be made to cover the four major fields and no home solicitations will be made.

Klamath Falls is the only point on the S.P. lines between San Francisco and Portland that has offered their employees this new opportunity to contribute once a year to a single fund.

Acceptance of this plan comes at an opportune time in connection with the forthcoming Red Cross campaign.

Legal Thief Slates Talk

International Pickpocket Fred Rorer comes to Klamath Falls Monday night—and Knife and Fork Club officials have warned club members to watch their wallets and valuables.

Rorer, who practices his talents merely for educational purposes—never in a criminal manner—has lifted valuables from some of the famous personalities of the country. He prefers to perform on celebrities, but is happy enough to practice on most anyone, his press notices claim.

His fame has preceded him, however. Rorer learned his "trade" in Europe, where he performed as a magician. Through friends he became a student in "underground" universities for pickpockets so he could put on better magic shows.

Since then he has turned to educating the public and revealing to law enforcement agencies the secrets of pickpockets.

He's to reveal those secrets Monday night before Knife and Forkers in the Willard Banquet room.

On advice of City Atty. Henry Perkins, the council voted Dec. 15 to give up on what was designed to be an exclusive and picturesque residential area in the rolling hills behind the Hot Springs section.

Perkins, who had personally acquired some 800 lots in the proposed new development, told the council refusal of a few property owners to cooperate in the plan had blocked it. Perkins bought his lots from the county for \$3,450.

As the realtors discussed the matter yesterday, they looked at large maps and drawings of the proposed development offered by John Howard, city planner and architect, who with his partner, Architect Murdo Morrison, designed Eldorado Heights for the City Planning Board.

The new development, with contour streets avoiding steep grades, would provide some 1,100 choice home sites. Lots would be of different sizes with a minimum frontage of 50 feet.

The present "checkerboard" or "gridiron" plan for the area provides 25-foot lots with some streets that would be so steep they would be practically impossible for normal traffic.

The realtors yesterday arrived at no specific plan in their open meeting but held a lengthy closed session to discuss the matter further.
